If we run out of room, we always try to carry articles over to the next edition if practicable. In short, if your submission didn't make it in, look for it in September.

This month's newspaper also features a very large number of photos of Grand Masters Day. If you didn't go to Grand Masters Day (and if you didn't, why not?) you can see what you missed – it really is a fun day. If you did, you could enjoy the photos, reminisce on your time there, and look forward to next year.

As previously mentioned, we don't publish in August. In light of that, we wish you an amazing summer, whatever you have planned, with brothers, friends and family.

Finally, as that old song by The Tempos says, "See You in September."



# Grand Master's Message

Greetings to all,

First, I would like to mention that all of the District Deputy

presentations have been held for the year. Congratulations to all my deputies and their AGMs! It was a pleasure to attend your celebrations, and I thank you and your lodges for your hospitality. To be of service is an honor for each one of us. We have a lot of work ahead of us this year. The work we do will determine the harvest we reap.

As I have stated previously, membership is my main focus for the jurisdiction. The vitality of our fraternity depends on continually bringing in good quality men, providing them mentoring, and helping them progress from degree to degree. Setting men to work and giving them good instruction for their labor is also key. Lodges that are involved in community action provide their members with worthy endeavors which keep brothers interested and motivated because they know that they are making a difference. To take a chair and move through the places and stations cannot be the only objective to look forward to for an up-and-coming Master Mason.

Lodge Prospect Managers for Blue Wave inquiries will be happy to know that the process has been fine tuned. New conditional forwarding has been established that routes known ineligible individuals to separate landing pages. Prospect Managers should see far fewer ineligible inquiries. In an effort to assist the broader Masonic family, those landing pages inform out-of-state inquiries to reach out to the state in which they live. Female inquiries are informed that our Masonic family is composed of many organizations, and each organization has its own specific eligibility requirements and practices. Our new conditional landing pages contain brief information that is presented regarding the Order of the Eastern Star, The Order of the Amaranth, and The Daughters of the Nile.

I am asking all Prospect Managers to make a diligent effort to acknowledge receipt of the inquiry within 24-48 hours of it being assigned to the lodge. The goal is to make an initial effort to communicate to the inquirer within 48 hours of them expressing interest. Many of you have stepped up the pace of acknowledging receipt of inquiries. Thank you for your efforts.

Please remember you don't have to limit the first meet and greet to an invitation to a pre-lodge meeting dinner. Grabbing a coffee and a donut is a great ice breaker or meeting at any public place is an equally viable alternative. Interesting feedback from a prospect earlier this year was: "The dinner with a room full of strangers that all knew each other. It was a bit intimidating."

I am trying to convey the importance of being flexible and attentive to an individual who has expressed interest. To lose a prospect due to a long delay of a response would be a disservice to the lodge and the prospect. Let's reach back to these interested men in our communities as soon as possible.

Please remember to complete the 'Notes Section' in Grandview for every action done with a prospect's record. These notes are indispensable when I ask the District Grand Lodge Officer to review the status of the inquiries with me.

Keep the WAVE going!!

# Grand Chaplain's Message

Prethren, as the days lengthen and the warmth of the sun embraces us, I hope this season finds each of you in good health and spirits. May

you enjoy some well-deserved time with your families, finding rest and refreshment in their company. As we recharge our batteries and prepare ourselves for trips, cookouts, and just plain lazy days in the sun, I invite you to meditate on a passage from 2 Kings, Chapter 6, a profound account that resonates deeply with the tenets we hold dear as Freemasons.

The prophet Elisha, a man of unwavering faith, found himself and his servant in a perilous situation. Surrounded by the Syrian army, sent to capture Elisha, the servant was overcome with fear, seeing only the vast host arrayed against them. "Alas, my master! How shall we do?" he cried, his voice heavy with despair. How often, my brethren, do we find ourselves in similar straits, looking at the challenges before us and feeling utterly outnumbered, overwhelmed by the apparent strength of the forces arrayed against our endeavors?

But Elisha, a true exemplar of faith, remained calm. He did not succumb to panic or doubt. Instead, he uttered a simple, yet profound prayer: "Lord, I pray thee, open his eyes, that he may see." And the Lord, in His infinite mercy, answered. The servant's eyes were opened, and he beheld not the menacing Syrian army, but a sight of unimaginable glory: "the mountain was full of horses and chariots of fire round about Elisha."

This, my brethren, is a potent lesson in faith. The visible world, with its trials and tribulations, often blinds us to the unseen realities. The servant saw only the physical threat, but Elisha, through his spiritual vision, understood that the forces of righteousness, though unseen, were far greater. As Freemasons, we are constantly reminded to look beyond the superficial, to cultivate an inner sight that discerns the spiritual truths underlying the material world. Our faith in the Grand Architect of the Universe is not a passive belief, but an active trust that even when the path seems darkest and the odds insurmountable, His divine providence is ever at work, guiding and protecting those who strive to do His will.

This narrative also speaks powerfully to perseverance. Elisha did not falter in his duty, even when faced with overwhelming odds. He stood firm, demonstrating an unwavering commitment to his divine calling. In our Masonic journey, we too encounter

obstacles and moments of discouragement. It is in these times that our vows of perseverance are truly tested. Do we falter, or do we, like Elisha, stand firm, trusting that our labors, performed with integrity and dedication, will ultimately be crowned with success, even if the immediate outcome is not apparent?

Furthermore, this passage underscores our duty and honor to the Lord above all other things. Elisha, though a prophet in a land governed by kings, placed his allegiance squarely with God. His actions were dictated not by political expediency or fear of earthly power, but by his unwavering commitment to divine truth. As Freemasons, we are taught to be loyal citizens and to respect the laws of the land. Yet, our ultimate allegiance, our highest duty, is to the principles of morality and virtue, to the Great Light that guides our path. When there is a conflict between the dictates of man and the divine imperatives, our honor demands that we choose the latter, ever mindful that our Craft is founded upon the most profound reverence for the Creator.

So, brethren, as we return to the world with all its beauty and splendor to create cherished memories beyond the lodge, let us carry with us the spirit of Elisha. Let us cultivate a faith that sees beyond the immediate challenges, a perseverance that stands firm in the face of adversity, and an unwavering duty and honor to the Lord above all else. For truly, when our eyes are opened, we too may find that the mountains are indeed full of unseen forces, working for our good and the glory of the Grand Architect of the Universe.

# Grand Historian's Corner

Revolution was to be fought in hopes of bringing about the union of the 13 colonies under self-government and

casting off tyranny. The colonies had a common heritage of race and a common tongue, the bulk of the colonists were of Anglo-Saxon origin, the English Bible lay on every altar, and in every home, and English customs, laws and culture were the basis of colonial life.

The Masonic lodge was the same throughout the colonies; through its fraternal mediation they all met on a common footing, in harmony and goodwill.

This condition holds as true today as it did in Revolutionary times. Under Masonry's banner men of all political shades and faiths, races and creeds, beliefs and stations in life, meet on the level of the Masonic lodge, so that Masonry's stabilizing influence is still an important factor in national life and a priceless heritage that must be preserved inviolate and handed down to our children's children.

RWB Joseph Fort Newton, D.D., wrote on the 150th anniversary of American independence, this gem of Masonic literature, under the caption "The Drums of '75."

"What emotions, what historic memories are awakened in our hearts by the anniversary of the first scenes of the American Revolution. An oft-told story, it still stirs us like a drumbeat in our blood, like a singing memory in our souls. To England it was an episode; to us it is an epic period. Time does not tarnish its thrilling events, nor distance dim the glory of days that tried the faith and fortitude of our fathers.

The Boston Massacre; the Tea Party planned in old St. Andrew's Lodge; the fight on Lexington green; the stand at Concord bridge, and the "shot heard 'round the world"; the fall of Warren at Bunker Hill; the genius of Washington; the great Declaration; the dark days at Valley Forge; the crossing of the Delaware; the coming of LaFayette; the final scene at Yorktown-it is a drama of history, but it reads like the record in our family Bible!

Goodwill to men! America was born-the last great hope of humanity, in which the will of the Grand Architect and the heroism of a man united to create a nation "conceived in liberty" and dedicated to the inalienable rights of manhood. Holding in his hand the old musket

that fired the first shot, LaFayette exclaimed: "This is the alarm gun of liberty." Its flash divided the story of a man into before and after, and its echoes will never die while men love freedom.

Over all, through all-gentle, wise and strong-the spirit of our ancient Craft presided in the birth hour of our republic, as it guards its sanctity today; and if it is worthy of its obligations and opportunities, it will keep that which our fathers entrusted to our care, shaping the greater America of tomorrow after the pattern wrought of the Grand Architect and the courage of consecrated men."

At a time and place long forgotten, WB George Washington gave a Masonic address:

"No institution was ever raised upon a better principle or more solid foundation than our beloved fraternity. I therefore feel that the newly-born American Nation of 1776, dedicated to Liberty and equal rights of man, can in no better way make sure of a permanent existence as a Nation, consecrated to the upbuilding of righteousness in the world, than by reading into its constitution and symbolizing in its banner those principles which have made Freemasonry an eternally great and good force in the affairs of mankind."

What will you be doing in the days leading up to and including July 4, 2026? Let us all help celebrate our 250th birthday. What can we as Masons in Connecticut do?

# From the Desk of Bro. Jon-Paul Venoit

ur region experienced its 15th consecutive rainy Saturday on June 14. But that wasn't going to stop Masonicare from celebrating another Grand Masters Day Family Festival on our Wallingford campus, where it was my honor to welcome Bro. Rinaldo Magliano, Jr., Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Connecticut A.F. & A.M., and the Honorable Most Worshipful Bro. Daniel Blackmon, Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut. Thank you to everyone who attended!

Last month was also the annual conference of the Masonic Communities and Services Association (MCSA). This year's conference was held in Arlington, TX, not far from some of the communities being managed by our consulting firm, Long Hill. It was fitting, then, that Bro. David Lawler, Masonicare CFO and President of Long Hill, and other members of our consulting team joined us at the event.

MCSA draws Masonic-sponsored human-service organizations and charities from across the country, some of which are facing significant economic challenges. # **Hamilton Council** No. 9 Donates to Medical **Research Foundation**



demands a rigorous and ever-present conscious desire. Freemasonry sets the initial foundation for this process by instructing its members to engage in hard work, education and diligent effort to begin to remove the rough edges in one's proverbial ashlar. The decision to make only moral decisions in one's life, to commit to acts of love or service, will help the lower self in laying an initial basic foundation.

It is necessary to work this system in silence because the vast population is riddled with corruption and will seek to dissuade one from this purpose. There are very many tiers to the work, and very few manage to truly accomplish the transformative work that is offered in the Blue Lodge. Those who maintain an enthusiasm, thirst, and drive to accomplish more can seek "More Light" in the appendant bodies. Thereafter other venues exist.

If one takes his degrees seriously, he will find that the school of life will give ample opportunity to make use of the tools that have been given in each of the degrees. These tools are not only symbols, but actual mechanisms that will enable one to face and overcome the spiritual simulation that is daily life.

We have previously spoken about the unity of body and spirit in homo sapiens. These are two bodies which all carry about themselves. The physical body is created as per Genesis 2:7, while the creation of the spiritual body is alluded to in Genesis 1:26-27. Both bodies bear their own consciousness. The physical body brings daily normal workaday consciousness. The spiritual body (soul) gives a subliminal consciousness that is typically buried below the

threshold of the ordinary consciousness.

This summer you might want to explore J. Milne Bramwell's Hypnotism: Its History, Practice and Theory. None of this is productive and elevating however, unless you master and accomplish the smoothing out of your own Rough Ashlar first. Remember that the fate of the three Ruffians actually depicts what happens when one attempts to jump ahead before having completed the preparatory work. This requires patience and honest effort that no can do for you, and which no one but yourself can evaluate the verity of your achievement. Enjoy your summer!

# Who, What, When, Where, (we know the) Why -- You Choose the Order by Francis G. Way

ny great newspaper article, even any passable newspaper article, or for that matter just any credible piece of non-fiction writing, Lincludes the above very important points. What the thing was, when the thing was, who did the thing, and where the thing was. Why the thing happened is also important, but for a lot of articles that appear in the Connecticut Freemasons the why is usually "because they're Masons and they do what Masons do." Those five Ws (sometimes spiced up with an H for how if it's needed) are the engine that makes any article run.

Now, imagine portraying an Entered Apprentice Degree and not giving the charge or working tools. Or, worse, not doing the obligation. Aside from quite possibly having conducted an invalid degree, you haven't given the whole story - how can a man truly be an Entered Apprentice when he hasn't been properly instructed? In a sense, when you leave out any of the Five Ws, that's essentially what you're doing to your article.

Let's say your lodge does something worthy of an article. It could be something regular, like the aforementioned Entered Apprentice Degree, or something special, like hosting a car show or an event for local students to get school supplies. A well-constructed article will inform that user what the event was about ("the lodge solicited donations of school supplies and then went to AB School on May 3, to distribute them to the students"), which covers what, when and where. Who went? ("WM Joe Mason and three of his officers took time off from work to bring the supplies during the school day.") In two sentences all of the important information is put out there for the reader.

If the "why" is more special than "Masons doing what Masons do," then include that as well. As in, "The lodge takes a special interesting in the local students because the brothers believe they are the future of the community," would be a perfectly valid why statement.

If the article is not about a newsworthy event, for example, an esoteric subject or a piece on the symbolism of the working tools, the five Ws are obviously more relaxed and may be completely replaced by the exposition of the subject. But they're still there working behind the scenes.

And lastly, here's a bonus tip: don't bury your lead. If your article is about a lodge event, don't wait until three paragraphs down to divulge what the event was. It doesn't need to be in the first sentence (nor do all 5 Ws for that matter) but it should be in the first paragraph. Ideally you hook your reader right there and they're drawn in to find out more about the event. If the event is a Hawaiian shirt cookout and there are four paragraphs discussing the history of the Hawaiian shirt and its significance in late spring Masonic cookouts before finally that the cookout was at Mountain Springs Lodge No. 1234, many readers might just say "next," and be on to the next article quicker than Bill Belichick was on to Cincinnati.

In short, you don't have to be Ben Bradlee, Grantland Rice, Damon Runyon, Carl Bernstein, or even Hunter S. Thompson to put out a great article. Just start by including the five Ws and see where that takes you...



# Norwich Masonic Temple Facade Tablets by Greg Webster

uilt in 1928, the Norwich Masonic Temple at the corner of Washington Street and Sachem Street had five Masonic ornamental facade tablets secured to the outside upper portion of the front wall of the Temple. The tablets included the Blue Lodge Square and Compasses, the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, and the York Rite Chapter, Council, and Commandery.

In 2006, this beautiful Masonic Temple was demolished, and sadly, the Council and Commandery tablets did not survive. Only three remain. The three pictured here have recently been cleaned up, repainted, and partially rebuilt to repair damage. They now are on display in the foyer of Somerset-St. James Lodge No. 34 in Preston.




## A Past Master Returns to Putnam Lodge No. 46




