



Our employees made that experience and countless others possible in 2022 with the support of our dedicated volunteers, generous donors, corporate partners, and YOU, the Masonic Family.


What's in store for Masonicare in 2023? Hopefully, a lot! Here are some of the initiatives we're working on:

- Navigator Program: For many people, navigating the senior care industry can be confusing and stressful. "In the conversations we have with the adult child, spouse, or other caregiver," Bro. Carl explains, "we try to help them figure out the best way forward for their loved one. Is it to bring services into the home? Do we explore moving to an independent or assisted living community? Or does the person

need around-the-clock care in a skilled nursing environment? It's an opportunity to consider all possibilities. And we encourage forward-thinking: making a plan before circumstances force you to make a last-minute decision."

"Along with asking the right questions," Audrey adds, "we find it really important to listen. That's the best way to meet someone where they are and try to meet their needs and expectations. We speak to people who say they promised their parent or

spouse they would keep them at home, no matter what. So we don't try to talk anyone into using a particular service of Masonicare. We want to help families find a solution that will make their loved one comfortable and happy, but also a solution that is sustainable."

Both Carl and Audrey say that one of the biggest misconceptions the public has about Masonicare is that it's beyond the financial reach of most families. In fact, Masonicare offers a wide range of residential living options at different price points. We begin a new year at the Lafayette Consistory with an emphasis on Family Life events which are open to Rite and prospective members. January sees us with the winter version of the Scotch and Cigar Night on Friday, January 13, from 7-10 p.m. at the Stamford Cigar Bar, 75 Research Drive. This is followed by the annual mid-winter pilgrimage to Stratford's Two Road Breweries for beer, pizza, and perhaps some impromptu entertainment or Masonic education on the afternoon of February 5.

What is truly special this winter is a worldwide telecast from

Lexington, of the Valley of Bridgeport's portrayal of the 22nd Degree, "Knight of the Sun," that was videotaped at the theater last November. While details are being arranged as this is written, there will be an in-person presentation of the telecast at the theater in Stratford for Rite members. If you cannot make it to the theater, the broadcast will be transmitted via the internet on Thursday Nite at the Rite programming, accessible thru the Member Portal, so you can watch at home at 7:30 p.m. that evening.

Looking further ahead into the winter season, degree work commences in February at the theater in Stratford. On

February 6, the Valley of Bridgeport will present the 4th and 10th Degrees live. On February 27, the 23rd Degree will be presented live, followed by the 31st Degree on video.

For those in the southwest corner of the state, the Valley of Bridgeport will do a "RITE on the Road" on the evening of Wednesday, March 8, at Ivanhoe Lodge No. 107, located at 354 Post Road in Darien. A presentation of the 4th Degree will be made in a tiled environment following the regular Stated Communication that evening. If you are interested in starting your Scottish Rite curriculum, this will be an excellent opportunity to do so without braving the I-95 traffic to Bridgeport. All Rite members are invited to attend. Arrangements for new candidates must be made at least a week in advance, so please call the Consistory office at (203) 375-0064 for instructions. Rite members need only show their 2023 membership card. Typically, the hosting lodge has a collation

at 7 p.m., and the Stated Communication begins at 8 p.m. I would recommend that you contact the Worshipful Master, Steven Shapiro, via email sbs@compuserve.com, in advance so that they have adequate food on hand.


There are many impediments to attaining the light, but perhaps one of the greatest is the caustic passion of envy. Envy is a vice that is wholly opposite to the virtue of love. There are two types of envy, and I am sure you have witnessed either during the course of your lifetime. The first is the sadness that arises

Also, "He who rejoices at other people's misfortunes will not go unpunished." Saint Gregory said, "there is no greater torment in the world than envy and that where there is envy, there cannot be love." Seneca also went on to say,

Quest For the Cache

full-resolution image of the original map was posted on Reddit and after being cross-posted a few times by other users, it wound up on Reddit's "codes" page, where it was finally cracked.

A user named "therealbradholley" cracked the difficult first half of the cipher, which may have been easier for a Mason being that one had to start off facing East to read it. He then became stumped on the second half, which turned into a double cipher that read as gibberish unless the necessary steps were known to unlock it. Only a Fellowcraft would know those, given the education he receives in the second degree.

The first half read as follows:

"Brothers behold, how good and pleasant it is for brothers to dwell together in unity. Only a craftsman of his degree will know the steps needed to unlocking the key."

"Therealbradholley" then shared it on Reddit's codes page, and the second part was decrypted by the user named "CodeWarrior0." He laid out the text and lined up the repeating letters vertically in columns. This was not the way the code was intended to be decrypted, but he arrived at the answer, nonetheless. In stacking the text, he revealed that every 3rd, 5th, and 7th letter was distinct from the repeating double As, Bs and Cs. Fellowcraft learn the importance of these numbers and the context clues on the plate indicate that a Fellowcraft's knowledge is needed to unlock that portion of the cipher. These distinctive letters, when pieced together separately, revealed the second part of the passage, which read as follows:

"West to East beneath 3 sacred cubits reach, is a key of 2 paths, but only 1 is of 3."

Though the spiraling message and double cipher were decrypted and considered solved on Reddit's codes page, the clue hinted at a specific location and had yet remained undiscovered...

Until an individual who had previously attended Union Lodge reached out. Taking the clue and noting that the spiral ended at Union Lodge on the map, this brother was able to deduce from memory that if one were inside Union Lodge and stood in the west in front of the Senior Warden, and measured three sacred cubits toward the east, one would arrive at Union Lodge's altar.

It is written in the Great Light that a sacred cubit is 36 inches, and the profane cubit is 18 inches. Many answers in this quest can be found within the Great Light, and frequenting those pages is encouraged. Below Union Lodge's altar was hidden, the second clue in this quest.

"Do not offend anyone and do not acquire enemies. But envy does both to a high degree." Saint Augustine said, "He who is envious can love no one, and so there can be no worse vice than envy." I call your attention to the Old Testament as well, wherein Cain saw his brother Able prospering and that his property was everincreasing. Out of envy, Cain slew Able, and thus the first two brothers to live on earth also ended up shedding the first blood ever on Earth.

The Roman historian Livy was quoted, "Envy is blind, and she has no other quality than that of detracting from virtue." Anything that detracts from our virtue is a step backward from our search for light. The subduing of the passions is a difficult task. Envy is one of the most virulent and destructive of all the passions. Recognizing this and subduing the urge to envy is one of the tasks that we as Masons and seekers of light, must confront and subdue if we are to make progress up Jacob's ladder.

Since Union Lodge had recently relocated, the clue had been removed and was recently presented to the brother, as he was the first one who had totally figured it out and contacted me. This brother in now working towards the third clue. The second clue is now also being shared in the Connecticut Freemasons for all other brothers who may be interested.

The second clue was a puzzle box. At first glance, it is an overhead view of Union Lodge's old temple room. On the west side of the altar is a passage on a scroll that reads... "Straight and narrow be thy path, rough ashlar be his first stone. Hew then mark but where to place. His moral compass helps it be known."

The rough ashlar is symbolic of an Entered Apprentice. Rough on the edges, crude and undressed in comparison to the perfect ashlar, which is polished, hewn, and fit for the builders' use. In operative Masonry, the first stone. sometimes referred to as the "cornerstone," is usually laid in the northeast corner of a building. In Union Lodge, an Entered Apprentice is placed at a specific point within the lodge room. Knowing this position and utilizing the compass, one may be able to locate the position and the correct key slot to unlock this puzzle box, but choosing the wrong one could potentially damage the contents, and nor will just any key work. Only the compass needle affixed to the map on the first clue will unlock it. As the clue read, "His moral compass helps it be known."

Currently, that key and other portions of the map are in the possession of Union Lodge, as one of their Past Masters has expressed the most interest and had taken the initiative, traveling to other lodges to piece together the original five pieces of the District 1A map.

Once unlocked, the contents of the box were revealed to contain a large decorative Masonic level embellished with filigree and, as its plummet, a cut and polished 65-carat sapphire stone. This decorative Mason's tool is more than meets the eye and will lead to the next clue.

Again, this is for fun, and all are welcome to participate.

The Pythagorean Tetrakty, Part One: The Point

This is the first installment of a four-part series of articles on the Pythagorean Tetraktys. I'm writing this in four parts because this fascinating geometrical figure cosmogonically unfolds in four distinct stages, each having both a geometrical and metaphysical significance. This dynamic, I found to be in keeping with the operative and speculative denominations of the Craft, as well as Freemasonry's veneration for geometry: "the first and noblest of sciences, [and] the basis upon which the superstructure of Masonry is erected." In its Masonic context, the tetraktys may be encountered everywhere, from the old Prestonian lectures to its appearance on the jewels and in the attendant symbolism of certain (primarily Continental) jurisdictions.

What is the Tetraktys?

The tetraktys (Greek: τετραμτύς) is a mystical figure first utilized in the teachings of the Craft's "ancient friend and Brother" Pythagoras of Samos. The philosopher and his followers held the symbol in such high regard that they deemed it "holy" and were said to have taken their oaths upon it. [Mackey, *An Encyclopedia of Freemasonry and its Kindred Sciences*, Everts & Co., 1884; Entry: "Tetraktys"]

Bless us, divine number, thou who generated gods and men! O holy, holy Tetraktys, thou that containest the root and source of the eternally

flowing creation! For the divine number begins with the profound, pure unity until it comes to the holy four; then it begets the mother of all, the all-comprising, all-bounding, the first-born, the never-swerving, the never-tiring holy ten, the keyholder of all.

[Dantzig, Number: The Language of Science, Macmillan, 1930, p. 42]

The tetraktys consists of ten regularly spaced points arranged in an upward-pointing equilateral triangle, having one point on the top tier, two on the second, three on the third, and four at the bottom (see accompanying




illustration). It is a model illustrating the organization of space through the emanations of the Grand Geometer: from a point to a line, to a superficies, and, finally, to a solid. For the first installment of this four-part series, we will turn our attention to the first cosmogonical stage of this enigmatic figure: *the point*.

The Point

From the geometrical (operative) perspective, the point is the beginning, or origin, of all constructions. It describes a position without dimension, a location in space without magnitude. A point is located in space by reference to the three cartesian coordinates x, y, and z, of which it is the theoretical vertex. The abscissa (x-axis) runs side-to-side; the ordinate (y-axis) runs front-to-back, and the applicate (z-axis) runs up and down. Taken together, the three Working Tools of the Fellowcraft – *the* plumb, the level, and the square - may be seen to 'try' each of these dimensional coordinates. The plumb proves the applicate in that it tries a vertical line; the level proves the abscissa in that it tries the horizontal; and the square proves the ordinate in that it bisects the x-axis at the origin, thereby forming a 90° angle, which is, of course, a square.

Metaphysically (speculatively), or rather 'meta-geometrically,' the point is the singularity from whence spatial dimension comes into being – this being the essence of cosmogony, the origin of the very cosmos. In the Pythagorean tradition, the point, or *monad*, symbolizes God, as it was called the "First," the "Seed," and the "Builder." We are also reminded of the famous quote from the 12th-century theologian Alain de Lille (though Rabelais attributed it to Hermes Trismegistus), who said, "God is an intelligible sphere, whose center is everywhere and whose circumference is nowhere." In Freemasonry, we encounter this concept in reference to the Point within a Circle diagram, wherein the point represents the individual Mason, about which too much ink has already been spilt.

In the next article of this series, we will move on to the line (the second tier of the tetraktys, consisting of two points) and examine its operative and speculative implications...

The Tenet of Brotherly Love by Lee Martin

Then we speak about membership, we often focus on new brothers. An important part of membership, however, is the retention of those we already have.

One of the tenets of our fraternity is brotherly love. Lately, this has been on my mind as this tenet has directly increased my love for the fraternity.

I have had major depressive disorder since age 16. There have been long periods of remission, such as when I was in the officer line and then Master of my lodge in 2018. But even then, I had to fight to stay going. Each year I felt I was not good enough to move on. Most brothers never even knew this problem existed.

Then, around the middle of my year as Master, I started to notice neurological issues which, after many medical tests, were found to be attributed to the depression. Essentially my brain was short-circuiting. Then the COVID-19 pandemic hit, and, like many, my condition became even more severe.

Throughout that time and to the present, my brothers have consistently checked on me as they had noticed I went from being at every event to seldom leaving my house. Some, such as WB Chuck Landeau, call frequently. Others, such as Junior Warden Brian Sprouse, stop by to see how things are. A few weeks ago, Senior Warden Chris Woodward knocked on my door one day randomly with his spouse. They had "made too much corn chowder" (ironically, my favorite soup) and just happened to have an extra bread bowl. We both knew it was their way to get in to check on me. All this, and I have only been around minimally, at best, for about four years.

A bowl of soup, a quick visit, a phone call, or a text to ask how you are doing goes a long way to helping a brother feel that brotherly love. Check on your brothers. It will go a long way to retention of the brothers we have.

To those of you who read this and can relate to my experience, know that you are not alone. Your brothers are here for you.!

Finally, there is a Masonic play, *Martin and Max*, that many brothers have seen that addresses checking in on a brother. To those Master Masons who have not seen it, I strongly suggest visiting a lodge where it is being presented when you have the chance.




Pyramid Shriners Fundraise for Children at Rite Aid Pharmacy
