
Grand Master's Message - June

warm greeting to all. I begin this message by expressing my gratitude to everyone who supported and attended our recent gala celebration, held on May 7. Our committee members who organized the event went above and beyond to make the evening special. In addition to the fellowship we enjoyed, generosity abounded, and \$3,000 was raised for the needs of DeMolay and Rainbow. Thank you.

I also wish to express my sincere appreciation to our brothers throughout this jurisdiction for their dedication and commitment to be of service to one another, the general needs of their lodge, district, and the membership program we have launched. Within the first 60 days of our awareness outreach, our efforts resulted in more than 200 inquiries expressing interest in Freemasonry. Inquiries are being assigned to lodges in every district. This count does not include interest expressed, and petitions received through organic acquisition. In August, a report will be generated identifying how many new petitions our lodges have received. That figure will provide the Craft with a baseline for the projected growth in membership over the next nine months. Yes, I did say membership growth! The six-decade-long declining net membership trend is being extinguished by the Craft. Across the state, the brethren have drawn a line in the sand. Everywhere I have traveled, brothers are smiling, full of enthusiasm, and no longer believe in the myth of an inevitable declining membership.

From mid-April through May, I had the pleasure of visiting every district in the state, some districts more than once. I felt it was important that I personally delivered 'The Charge' to every new District Deputy, and as of June 1, that objective has been met. In every case, in every place where I visited, there are brothers who appear energized, optimistic, and on fire with motivation to



that there is nothing beyond the Grand Architect's ability to repair, restore, or bring to pass. It is our relationship with the Almighty that matters most. The teachings of Freemasonry repeatedly make that point very clear.

When our desire for growth is to be of greater service to our communities, and we humbly ask the Grand Architect for guidance and help, blessings will be provided. o many of the buildings on Masonicare's Wallingford campus were dedicated as tributes to the builders, visionaries, and benefactors who furthered our benevolent mission: Charles A. Ramage, Frank L. Wilder, A. Norman Johnson, Leslie G. Wright, and Kenneth B. Hawkins, Sr. to name just a few.

Now, the Masonicare Medical Office Building will be renamed the Erickson Medical Building in honor of longtime Board of Trustees Chairman Bro. Carleton V. Erickson, Right Worshipful Past District Deputy. Friends, family, Masonic dignitaries, and Masonicare colleagues past and present will join Bro. Carleton at a special renaming ceremony beginning at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 10 (Grand Masters Day).

A funeral director by trade and owner of Beecher & Bennett, Inc., Bro. Carleton joined the Board of Managers of The Masonic Charity Foundation in 1983. When he succeeded Board President Arthur (Bud) Simpson in 1986, Bro. Carleton became the first man to hold the leadership role without having come through the Grand Line. In 1994, he was instrumental in the corporate reorganization that created "Masonicare" as a parent company for the various affiliates.

Bro. Carleton's 17 years at the helm was a period marked by unprecedented growth for the organization that included entry into the home health business, the construction of Pond Ridge Assisted Living, the Leslie G. Wright Residence, and the A. Norman Johnson Apartments, as well as the expansion of Masonicare at Ashlar Village, where he lives today with his wife, Georgia.

What I've always admired and appreciated most about Carleton is how his focus has always been about doing the right thing for Masonicare. During board meetings, he would talk a lot about the mission of the organization and how we were going to push forward. And he always asked every person in the room to give their input. He had a distinctive presence that commanded respect.



Carleton was someone who valued traditions but was also willing to embrace new strategies and ideas. Maybe that's why he was so supportive of me when I was chosen to serve as President of Ashlar Village back in 1999. I do laugh when I remember how he told me I wasn't ready ... but that's Carleton. He was just being honest and, again, putting the organization first. I am deeply grateful that he has continued to be a voice of support for me over the years and looking forward to celebrating his dedication to the mission of Masonicare.

Grand Chaplain's Corner

"Blessed and Blessings"

Recently, I was fortunate to be included in the cast for the 18th Degree of Scottish Rite Masonry, "Knight of the Rose Croix," performed in excellent fashion by the Valley of New Haven. The Scottish Rite system of degrees divides the 32 different degrees into sets that are performed by specific bodies.

The first three being the Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason, are performed by the Blue Lodge, of course. After those, the remaining 29 are portrayed by certain bodies which have in their degrees specific messages and goals. The Lodge of Perfection performs Degrees 4-14 which are called the "Ineffable Degrees," and draws their lessons from the biblical era leading up to the building of King Solomon's Temple. Degrees 15 and 16 are portrayed by the Council of Princes of Jerusalem and are centered around the captivity and subsequent release of the Israelites from Babylon and the rebuilding of the Temple.

The 17th and 18th Degrees are called the "Philosophical and Doctrinal Degrees" and are portrayed by the Chapter of Rose Croix. They strive for a deeper understanding of religion, philosophy, ethics, and history. The Knight of Rose Croix draws its tenets from the teachings of Jesus of Nazareth and features the "Sermon on the

Mount." It is in that sermon that Jesus gives the Beatitudes:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn: for they shall be comforted. Blessed



are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness: for they shall be satisfied. Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the sons of God. Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when men revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account."

As Masons, we are "blessed" to be able to share the knowledge and love of our Fraternity with others. It is a "blessing" that we do this while forging lifetime attachments and friendships that are based upon that shared knowledge and love. Jesus closed the sermon with words we all can follow: "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father, who is in heaven."

We offer our condolences to the families and friends of those brothers who have been called by The Grand Architect of the Universe.

Is Your Temple Being Properly Constructed?

The Valley of Bridgeport is gearing up for the 2023 summer season with degrees and Family Life events.

On June 4, there is a fishing trip leaving out of Clinton. These are very popular, and seating is limited, so contact the office as soon as possible if you are interested. On July 15, there is a Bus tour to the Vanderbilt Mansion in Hyde Park, NY, with a stop at a local winery and dinner at the Beekman Arms in Rhinebeck. On July 26, there is a trip to Yankee Stadium to see the Mets play the Yankees, and travel is on the Yankee Clipper on Metro North. On Saturday, August 5, there is the annual Clambake at Booth Memorial Park; on August 11, a Scotch and Cigar Night at the Stamford Cigar Bar; and on August 19, a Trip to Tanglewood in Lenox, MA, with a stop at a local winery. Degree work continues on Saturday, July 22, with a presentation of a live 14th Degree at 10:30 a.m., followed by a video rendition of the 6th Degree and preceded by the 4th Degree. After the degree work, there will be a sumptuous lunch at the Shrine building next door. Everyone should be heading home by 2:30 p.m., affording those older brothers plenty of daylight time to travel. Remember the theater and the lunchroom are air-conditioned. Those traveling from out of town can take Metro North, as the Stratford station is a few short feet from the theater.



The Holy Bible (the repository of Divine Laws) is the Great Light of Masonry and bears a profound meaning when coupled with the tradition of the Ineffable Name or Lost Word. The objective set before the Masonic Seeker is his personal search for the Lost Word. He may travel across many different lands and, along the way, receive Masters Wages (representing knowledge and power). In a much more profound and Kabbalistic sense, the esoteric meaning of the Master's Word is the Consciousness of the Soul, which grants the possessor thereof Master's wages, which entail Illumination and Immortality.

Accordingly, the wages of a Real Master are the satisfaction and spiritual power flowing from the possession of real knowledge. Pike once wrote that the power of the Word lies in the knowledge of the philosophy, which is its perfect synthesis. This, my brothers, is what is meant by "knowing how to pronounce the Word." The traditions, symbols, and ritual of our Blue Lodges center around the building of the Temple. The legend of the Widow's Son, Hiram Abiff, who lost his life in the defense of his integrity (which every Seeker must be ready to do) and the Search for the Lost Word. As our candidates progress through the degrees, they are furnished with the Working Tools suited to his degree of knowledge and proficiency and given instructions on their use. Simultaneously the lesser and greater

Lights are revealed and explained. Through this curriculum, each outer form or material thing is shown to be a symbol of a deeper mystery with a concealed potency.

If one steps back and re-reads the rituals of each degree in a quiet and solitary environment, stilling our minds to the noise of modern living, one can glean the essence of the Mysticism that is contained therein. In our ritual, King Solomon's Temple is a symbol. The building and restoration of the Temple in Jerusalem, which play prominent parts in our Blue Lodge ritual and some of the Scottish Rite degrees, are a sophisticated play on words and a parity of events which are but allegories for the personal drama that every Soul must pass if it is to attain Soul Consciousness and reach, in part, what Jung once called Self Individuation. Thus, we can infer that the Real Temple (and perhaps the only one worth considering) referred to from first to last in Freemasonry, as in the Schools of Ancient Initiation, is the Tabernacle of the Soul.





Book Review: From Paratrooper to Public Defender

From *Paratrooper to Public Defender* is a book by RWB Morton N. Katz. I have had the distinct pleasure of knowing RWB Mort for many years as we are both members of Wyllys St. John's Lodge No. 4. Therefore, when I discovered that he has authored a book on his reminiscences, I immediately ordered a copy. Reading it is more like listening to RWB Mort enthrall me with stories of his incredibly interesting life than reading a biography. It is filled with personal remembrance of events that were sometimes exciting, occasionally terrifying, often amusing, and many times poignant.

He had received a Commission through the Citizens Military Training Camp as his chemistry labs interfered with his continuing through Advanced ROTC. While working on his master's degree at Iowa State College, he was attending a meeting in the Student Union on December 7, 1941, when he learned of the bombing of Pearl Harbor and four days later received orders to report to Fort Benning.

His career as a paratrooper began when he signed an attendance sheet for a briefing about Parachute School, only to discover that in so doing, he had volunteered. He became part of the 509th Parachute Infantry in North Africa, and one of his first training jumps almost became his last when his parachute malfunctioned, finally opening too close to the ground, but he avoided injury.

He served throughout the African Campaign and was part of the invasion force landing at Anzio (where he was awarded a Bronze Star). He saw combat in World War II

Division. He includes many personal observations regarding the officers with whom he served and events that made a special impression. Two of the most poignant were the liberation of the Wobbelin concentration camp and his being given the honor of reading the first blessing at the reading of the Torah when the principal synagogue in Berlin was re-consecrated after having been closed and desecrated by the Nazis.

He went on to law school and a career as a Public Defender and Magistrate, retiring at the age of 100. He remained in the Army Reserves and retired in 1972 as a Colonel. He was born on May 15, 1919 (Straw Hat Day), and will be turning 104 shortly after my writing of this review.

He was initiated as an EA on May 2, 1962, passed to FC on June 20, 1962, and raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on November 7, 1962. He served Wyllys Lodge No. 99 as Worshipful Master in 1976 and as District Deputy of Masonic District 6A in 1984 and 1985. He also served six terms as Chairman of the Trial Commission and received the Pierpont Edwards Medal in Bronze on June 17, 2013.

I heartily recommend this outstanding set of personal observations that cover an important period of our history from a remarkable brother Mason who has served both his country and Freemasonry with great distinction. The 92-page book is available at Amazon.

A Full House at Warren Lodge No. 51

He elucidated on the "Missing Link in Freemasonry," Cleopatra's Needles, which are a pair of ancient Egyptian obelisks, now separated, in London and New York City. The obelisks were originally made in Heliopolis (modern Cairo)

during the New Kingdom period, inscribed by the 18th dynasty pharaoh Thutmose III and 19th dynasty pharaoh Ramesses II. They were later moved to the Caesareum of Alexandria, which had been conceived by Ptolemaic Queen Cleopatra VII, for whom the obelisks are named. They stood in Alexandria for almost two millennia until they were re-erected in London and New York City in 1877 and 1881, respectively. The Masonic symbolism held within the base of the structure leaves no doubt as to a connection.

Evergreen Lodge No. 88, Wooster Lodge No. 10, and Anchor Lodge No. 112, the room was full of interest and fervor. They also pointed out some other significant historical buildings within sight of Town Hall. I also was given some history of the Town of Clinton. Rightfully so, the brothers of Jeptha are proud of their town, their lodge, and their history.

When it was time for the presentation, I met RWB John Main, the Worshipful Master of Jeptha, on the level in the East. I turned over the Past Master jewel belonging to Lucius K. Stevens, who was Master of Jeptha Lodge in 1909. I explained to RWB Main and the



Moosup Lodge No. 113 Table Lodge Tribute to Ben Franklin

Thunder rumbled menacingly through the blackened lodge room, followed by a flash of lightning in the west. The chandeliers flickered and threw a dim light, revealing two men standing side by side, flying a kite in the maelstrom.

"Aren't you afraid?" asked William Franklin. "Afraid?" replied his father, Benjamin, "What is there to fear? Nature is God's creation, and in God, we trust!" With that, a large stroke of lightning and a squealing crack of thunder filled the room. Beside the two, a key enclosed in a mason jar began glowing with an electrical discharge. "Huzzah!" enthused the elder Franklin. "We have done it! Lightning in a bottle!" And with that, the Moosup Table Lodge had reached its crescendo and completion.


Widely regarded as the preeminent table lodge in the state, and perhaps anywhere, the Moosup Lodge No. 113 table lodge combines elaborate props, play-acting, and a subject that venerates a Masonic person or premise. This year's theme, Prometheus, honored MWB Benjamin Franklin, who, in his time, was referred to as "The Modern Day Prometheus" for his experiments in electricity. Each guest was presented with the customary toasting glass and a commemorative slate coaster, laser engraved with the evening's lightning bolt insignia.

"The lodge east is Tun Tavern," explained WB Chris Britland, who acted as William Franklin. "Three of us took a trip to Philadelphia to visit Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell, and the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania before coming up with the decorations and theme. Ben Franklin belonged to the first lodge in Philadelphia – St. John's Lodge No. 1 – and they originally met in the Tun Tavern."

Brother Bill Nagel, who portrayed MWB Franklin himself, stood before a full-sized replica of the Liberty Bell in the south and joked, "I think the guys are mad at me. I asked how I could help when we were building the props, and they told me to work on the bell – but I accidentally cracked it!"

"Each table lodge has a memento that everyone signs," explained RWB Bob Raymond. "We've had swords, gladiator helmets, bells; you name it. This year, we all signed the Declaration of Independence. We framed it, and it's hanging on the wall in our anteroom with all the other mementos. They give us a living record of each event and everyone who was there."

With the last morsel served and the last toast made, the festive board was complete, and the sell-out crowd stood to applaud the servers, actors, and kitchen crew, who once more

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
