## Grand Lodge Semi-Annual Communication by Francis G. Way

he Grand Lodge of Connecticut, AF&AM held its semi-annual Communication on a rainy Saturday, October 20, in the Hartog Auditorium. After a few early issues with the sound system, the meeting went off without a hitch, efficiently and expeditiously presided over by Most Worshipful Grand Master Joseph J. Porco. After opening at 9 a.m., Grand Master Porco went to the altar and offered a prayer of thanks to the Almighty.

Immediately there followed the roll call of Grand Lodge officers who answered their summons to the Celestial Lodge Above in the past year, seven in all including Grand Senior Warden Les B. King. The altar was draped and Grand Chaplain Christopher Earle offered a prayer.

After a roll call of lodges to ensure a quorum was present, the Grand Master proceeded to deliver highlights from his report, the full copy of which included in the records packet available to attendees. The Grand Master attended, and delivered the charge, at all 13 District Deputy presentations, accompanied by his line of Grand Lodge officers. He attended the ceremonies for the 300th Anniversary of the 1723 Constitutions. He also offered many thanks to various brothers and officers.

The highlight of the Grand Master's report was undoubtedly the great news about the Blue Wave program. To date, all districts have positive growth. Compared to the 3-month period before Blue Wave was introduced, petitions are up 492% overall, EAs by 517%, FCs by 469%, and Master Masters by 513%. These are phenomenal increases, which can only grow as more lodges become adept at working within the Blue Wave guidelines, and the Craft was most impressed. The Grand Master listed the 16 lodges who'd had growth of seven or more as part of the Blue Wave:

King Solomon's Lodge No. 6, Frederick-Franklin Lodge No.14, Columbia Lodge No. 25, Temple Lodge No. 65, Hartford-Evergreen Lodge No. 88, Brainard Lodge No. 102, and Unity Lodge No. 148: 7

Shepherd-Salem Lodge No. 78: 8

Fidelity-St. John's Lodge No 3, Hiram Lodge No. 18, Friendship Lodge No. 33, Annawon Lodge No. 115, and Universal Fraternity Lodge No. 149: Friendship Tuscan Lodge No. 145: Hiram Lodge No. 1: Trumbull Lodge No. 22:

The Grand Treasurer reminded lodges that the assessment and insurance premiums must be paid on time. The budget passed, with no increase in assessment and a return to full mailing of the *Connecticut Freemasons* newspaper.

Following refreshment, at which time the Masonicare Annual meeting was held, labor resumed with a very emotional presentation of the Hometown Hero Award. Grand Junior Warden Shane Dufresne, a Plainville police officer, presented an award to Brother Dave Wallace of Unity Lodge No. 148. Bro. Dave is a police dispatcher for the Bristol Police Department and was on duty on the night of October 12, 2022, when Lt. Dustin Demonte and Sgt. Alex Hamzy were killed in the line of duty. It was an exceptionally emotional moment, especially for current and past first responders in the room.

Legislation was presented to provide lodges the ability to charge Entered Apprentices and Fellowcrafts dues. There are some lodges in the jurisdiction where some brothers have remained Fellowcrafts for years, partaking in all the advantages of lodge life, but paying no dues. The measure passed, as did a follow-up housekeeping measure allowing lodges to drop EAs and FCs for non-payment of dues, subject to all the procedures previously outline for dropping a Master Mason.

The election was held, and the following brothers were elected to serve the Grand Lodge for the upcoming year: Grand Master-elect, RWB Edward C. Page; Deputy Grand Master-elect RWB Ronaldo F. Magliano; Grand Senior Warden-elect, RWB Shane Dufresne; Grand Junior Warden-elect, RWB F. Matthew Heinrich, Jr.; Grand Treasurer-elect, Thomas Gondek; Grand Secretary-elect James Anderson, and Trustee-elect, MWB Charles Yohe.

The Grand Master took a "soft poll" for solutions of the background check situation. Recent changes in national and Connecticut law regarding background check would have resulted in many more regulations, forms, procedures, and cost to be universally implemented by all lodges. The Grand Master wanted to gauge the Craft's wishes regarding the three proposed solutions that has been outlined in Grand View and emailing. The Craft overwhelmingly voted for the second proposal: lodge investigation committees searching three specific public websites (provided by Grand Lodge) and then making a favorable or unfavorable report to the lodge. Lodges would need to be mindful that the sex offender and criminal conviction information would apply only locally, and they should take extra care with petitioners who have recently moved into the area. Based upon those results, legislation will be drawn up by the Legal Matters Committee to be voted on in April.

RWB Carl Anderson, Grand Almoner gave a quick presentation on the Masonicare Navigator program, where one Masonicare employee is dedicated to answering and providing assistance to brothers who call the number on the back of their dues care. Inquiries about Masonicare services, senior healthcare, Medicare and Medicaid can all be easily provided. He also covered the new Women's and Widows program to bring women and widows together. A book and resources will be provided to the lodges and the program will be rolling out in November.

The Deputy Grand Master, RWB Edward C. Page then spoke on programs for his year as Grand Master. He remains committed to continuing the Blue Wave program. He feels that lodges need some help with ritual and is creating District Lecturer offices and asked the permanent members in their district meetings to provide him with names. He will be starting a Grand Master's Physical Fitness Council to help brothers attend to their physical well-being by providing Fitbit fitness trackers to any brother who wishes and outlined several fundraisers for the year (Table Lodge, Golf Tournament, Grand Master's private label bourbon and GM private label cigar). The theme of his year will be "God, Unity and Service." The words form an acronym, GUS, which was his father's nickname.

After presentations of the Perfect Ashlar Awards, the Grand Master closed the session in ample form, 30 minutes ahead of schedule.

#### ... thou, O God, wert merciful.



Brothers, I remain immensely grateful for the opportunity to serve. I have passed through the halfway point of my service as Grand Master and I will continue to be mindful of the obligation I have taken for the balance of my term in office and beyond.

In my first message to you back in April, I announced that I would endeavor to move this jurisdiction forward with tactical actions that would strengthen our membership and enhance our outreach to men in our local communities. I told you that doubt did not reside in me and with the help of the Grand Architect and a team of dedicated brothers, we would be able to achieve that goal. A significant number of our Lodges have embraced the plan and worked hard on execution. Degree work has been performed and active mentoring is occurring. I am pleased to announce that every district in the jurisdiction has achieved a positive membership growth rate over the last six months. RWB Nicholas Ives has recently completed a statewide mentoring class which has received glowing reviews. Similar classes will be offered.

Perhaps equally important as the success we are having in welcoming new brothers into our ranks is the public relations impact that we are having on thousands of Connecticut men. Over the last six months, we have been delivering positive internet content 'front and center' which dwarfs the negative internet content in comparison.

What is really exciting is that our professional digital media team along with the internal help of WB Douglas Barry of King Solomon's Lodge No. 7, is successfully placing the rich content (produced by the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction) before the eyes and ears of thousands and thousands of Connecticut men. The largest segment of men clicking on the content are between the ages of 25 to 50 and we are targeting men who are interested in social issues. When men choose to engage, they find



themselves on very fast loading pages where our content can be viewed. There have been thousands of clicks, engagements and views and we have received over 2,000 inquiries. At the time of drafting this message we have a running total for 2023 of 360 new men that are now either now EAs, FCs, MMs or petitioners waiting for their first degree. By November, when you read this message, the count will be higher.

If we continue at a similar pace, by April 2024 we should have a total of 700 new brothers with another 100 awaiting their first degree. State EMR Coordinator, RWB Mark Hawkins has informed the lodges that by simply adding an additional prospect manager at the lodge level, the workload will be easier. This simple action will help increase follow-up substantially. Brothers, the decision as to how far you wish to exceed expectations is in your hands. Have fun in the vineyard! Enjoy the harvest.

What some had thought was unsolvable, moreover impossible, has proven to be the opposite. Ultimate credit must be given where credit is due. We need not struggle aimlessly toward our goals, whatever they may be, as long those goals are in alignment with the Almighty's purposes. In that regard, the truth of the matter is simply this: the Grand Architect has allowed favor to be poured out upon us. I believe this is in response to beseeching Him. Let us be grateful.

There is nothing beyond the Grand Architect's ability to repair, restore, or bring to pass. The Grand Architect is faithful to the promises He makes. However, it is essential that we know what those promises are, to seek out His promises and when found to hold tight to them. Those promises are in the center of every lodge room, in the Good Book.

Brothers, all of us knelt at the altar and acknowledged our faith in the Almighty. Did we not? In the book of the Prophet Isaiah, 43:10, it is written, "You are My witness. You are My servant whom I have chosen, so that you may know and believe in Me and that you understand that I am He." #### **Going Home**



n September 24, the officers of the Grand Lodge and many brothers and friends assembled at the Norwich Holiday Inn for religious and Masonic Services in memory of our recently departed Grand Senior Warden Les B. King. Somerset St. James Lodge No. 34 performed the Masonic Service. I was honored to assist MWB Bruce R. Bellmore, RWB Carl Anderson, and WB William Weisert with the religious devotions.

I am sure that you have read in the pages of Connecticut Freemasons how very suddenly and tragically RWB Les was taken from us. Less than three weeks before his death, MWB Bruce and I had, what seemed at the time, the pleasure of visiting RWB Les in Backus Hospital in Norwich. He was very lucid and talked about when he would be going home. Bruce led the three of us in prayer that his recovery would be swift and his going home a reality. On the ride back to New Haven we spoke with Grand Master Joseph J. Porco, who informed us that the diagnosis for Les was dire and that the end could come soon. Indeed, Les was transferred to the Masonic Healthcare Center in Wallingford and passed away on July 22.

Several brothers and RWB Les' stepfather eulogized him at the memorial service. Something that Deputy Grand Master Edward Page said in his remarks about RWB Les really struck me. He said that, after each of his many visits to RWB Les he would pray that he recovered and would soon be going home. Right Worshipful Brother Edward then said "God answers all prayers. Unfortunately, sometimes that answer is 'No."

As Masons we listen to Ecclesiastes Chapter 12, Verse 5 in the Master Mason Degree lament that there is great sorrow "because man goeth to his long home, and the mourners go about the streets...Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was; and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it." So, you see, RWB Edward's prayer was ultimately answered in the affirmative, for Right Worshipful Brother Les was, indeed, going home.

## From the Desk of Bro. Jon-Paul Venoit President & CEO of Masonicare

The longevity of Masonicare employees really is something to behold. We attract great people and, very often, those people decide to put down roots with us that last decades.

Every November, we honor all the employees celebrating milestone anniversaries during that calendar year, starting with five years and up. This month, for the first time, we're going hold a single Milestone Party for all the honorees at Ashlar Village. These include 78 employees with at least 10 years of service, 27 with 20 or more years, and one – a nurse at Masonicare Health Center named Carolyn – who has been with us for an incredible 40 years! I'm very happy that we can give back to our employees in a way that, quite honestly, we could not have done six or seven years ago when our long-term financial outlook was less optimistic.

Whether here for 40 years or 40 days, our employees are key to Masonicare's strategic plan and our ability to continue to adapt to the ever-changing healthcare landscape. One way that we're doing that is by responding to the rapidly growing demand for geriatric behavioral health beds. We're adding seven more beds to our Behavioral Health Hospital at Masonicare Health Center, bringing the total number to 50. We're also continuing to explore partnerships and/or leasing opportunities with larger health networks across the state, provide consulting services through our GenM affiliate, and keep an eye out for possible acquisitions.

This is the first year that we are facing a "tripledemic" of flu, COVID and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV), all potentially circulating at the same time. The good news is that, per the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), it's also the first fall/winter virus season in which vaccines will be available for all three of these viruses which are responsible for most hospitalizations. Our leadership team and clinical

experts will continue to meet to discuss the best strategies to protect our residents, patients, staff, and others.

I want to thank everyone who supported or participated in the Walk to End Alzheimer's, an event that raises awareness and funds to fight Alzheimer's disease. I was honored to again serve as Chair of the Greater New Haven Walk, where the Masonicare Memory Keepers more than doubled their fundraising goal and had the most walkers at the event



with 104 (a record for us). Meanwhile, Masonicare at Mystic's team finished FIRST in dollars raised at the Eastern Connecticut Walk with \$11,360 (through Oct. 5).

And I was thrilled to learn that Masonicare was among this year's winners in the Record-Journal Readers' Choice Awards! We have won in three categories: Best In-Home Care, Best Independent Living Community (Ashlar Village) and Best Skilled Nursing (Masonicare Health Center). We were also named a finalist in the Best Assisted Living Community category. Thank you to all who voted for us!

In this season of gratitude, I want to thank you for your support of Masonicare and helping make it possible for us to enhance the quality of life of everyone we serve.

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## Dual Membership Has Many Advantages by Russell L. Scull



he Masonic Medical Research Institute is an internationally recognized biomedical research institute founded by the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons in the State of New York in 1958. It is dedicated to improving the health and quality of life for all humankind. Their primary mission is conducting high quality biomedical and clinical research aimed at generating knowledge and information necessary for understanding molecular mechanisms of disease and development of medical cures and treatments of tomorrow. The Institute is also committed to providing education and training to basic scientists, clinical researchers and students who will perpetuate and extend the fight against disease worldwide.

The Institute's vision is to build scientific teams that can better understand diseases and cure them, sharing their data and research, collaborating, and doing whatever it takes to combat disease. This is like Jonas Salk, the inventor of Polio vaccine, donating his discovery to the world.

The hard work of the scientists and staff at MMRI has not gone unnoticed, In January 2022, New York Governor Kathy Hochul mentioned MMRI in her State of the State book, citing MMRI as a key example of the benefits of investing in "health and clean tech research infrastructure." Additionally, their scientists published 25 top-tier, peerreviewed articles for scientific journals, increasing their overall nationwide footprint for research excellence.

In June, the American Heart Association awarded MMRI a Diversity Grant Supplement to promote diversity in science, and the institute reintroduced the Summer Fellowship program for the first time since 2019. And through iPS cell research they have been able to link autism with certain defects of the heart that could be potentially curable.

The Institute's faculty, postdoctoral fellows, technicians, students and visiting scholars are all part of a world-class team of scientists working together to improve the quality of life for all. Students are generally local to NY and NJ, postdoctoral fellows come from all over the world, currently they have postdoctoral researchers from Scotland, Brazil, and Australia.

The Masonic Medical Research Institute (MMRI) is administered by a Board of Directors, consisting of 15 distinguished Freemasons elected to three-year terms by the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, F &AM. Their selection is based upon their outstanding business and professional experience, and they all serve the Institute without compensation.
