The 235th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Connecticut by Francis G. Way

Promptly at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, April 6, the Deputy Grand Master, RWB Edward C. Page, received Brother Joseph J. Porco, Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Connecticut, into Grand Lodge, and MWB Porco then proceeded to open the Grant Lodge.

After the usual roll call of lodges and the Necrology that sadly included RWB Les B. King, who was the incumbent Grand Senior Warden when he passed, the Grand Master received the many distinguished guests who were attending the session. These included representatives from the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, the York Rite, and the Shrine. Immediately after, distinguished guests from sister jurisdictions were welcomed. These included Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Virginia, New Jersey, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Vermont, Delaware, Maine, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, the Ambassador from Lebanon to America, and last but certainly not least, Prince Hall Affiliation.

A large contingent of Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters of Connecticut was welcomed, MWB Charles Yohe (1996, 2015) being the most senior in attendance, and the current District Deputies, Associate Grand Marshals, Associate Grand Almoners, and Associate Grand Chaplains were also recognized. The Grand Lodge was called from Labor to Refreshment to welcome visitors from the concordant bodies. A contingent from DeMolay presented the National Colors. Representatives were received from Masonicare, DeMolay, the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, The Order of Eastern Star, Amaranth, and the Daughters of the Nile.

A Hometown Hero Award was then presented to WB Michael J. Waite of Meridian Lodge No. 77. WB Waite is a USPS Letter Carrier and was delivering mail at a condo complex in Wallingford in December 2023 when he saw smoke coming from one of the units. He quickly called the Fire Department and proceeded to alert residents, including a mother and her three daughters, who were asleep at the time. WB Waite's actions saved lives and his heroism was recognized by his brothers.

Following speeches from the distinguished representatives and slightly ahead of schedule, MWB Porco dismissed the Craft for lunch with instructions to be back by 1:15 p.m.

Following lunch, the Grand Lodge returned to labor. Illustrious Brother Kevin J. Hecht, Scottish Rite Deputy for Connecticut, and Sir Knight Hal Elwell, Very Eminent Deputy Grand Commander of Knights Templar, who was representing Right Eminent Grand Commander Edward C. Page, were invited to give remarks.

A report from MWB Chip Stamm, Chairman of the Fraternal Relations Committee, informed the Craft that full recognition has been extended to the Grand Lodge of Baja California and that two requests for recognition have been received from Grand Lodges in Brazil. Also of important note is that Amity is making a "Tyler's Book" available to any lodge (for \$16) that clearly and succinctly shows which lodges are in amity with Connecticut. That will make it easier to verify that visitors are from a grand jurisdiction recognized by Connecticut.

At that time, voting was taken up on the proposed background check legislation. The proposal concerned lodges doing background checks via publicly available websites (state judicial sites and sex offender registries) as opposed to using a paid service. The legislation was laid over from the semi-annual session in October. This legislation passed overwhelmingly.

After several reports (Grand Treasurer and CT Freemasons Foundation), a series of awards were presented to lodges and brothers.

RWB Edward C. Page, Deputy Grand Master, presented the Perfect Ashlar Awards. A group

of 25 brothers, possibly the largest group of Perfect Ashlar Award winners ever, came forward west of the altar to receive their certificates from RWB Page.

In addition, three lodges were recognized for having three or more Perfect Ashlar recipients in their lodge: Hiram Lodge No. 1, Seneca Lodge No. 55, and Annawon Lodge No. 115.

MWB Joseph J. Porco presented his Grand Master's report. Of the many accomplishments and highlights of his year in the Grand East, none was greater than his Blue Wave program that reversed 60 years of membership decline in this jurisdiction. For the first time in 60 years, Connecticut experienced positive growth, and the momentum established should easily carry forward.

MWB Porco presented awards to lodges who'd brought in the most members in the Blue Wave initiative. <u>Honorable Mention</u> was Hiram Lodge No. 18, Temple Lodge No. 22, and Universal Fraternity Lodge No. 149. <u>Runner Up (20</u> <u>additions)</u> was Hiram Lodge No. 1. <u>Grand Prize</u> (23 additions) went to Annawon Lodge No. 115.

Three brothers were recognized for outstanding service in the prospect manager role: WB Dennis Frosolone (Annawon Lodge No. 115), WB Albert R. Johnson (Hiram Lodge No. 1), and WB Anthony S. Neri (Hiram Lodge No. 18).

All in all, it was a phenomenal year for membership growth in Connecticut.

Following the awards, and some housekeeping regarding reports, MWB Porco called the Craft from Labor to Refreshment for the purpose of installing the new Grand Lodge officers.

Installation of MWB Edward C. Page, 178th Grand Master



Brotherly Love and Affection

Those hurdles and setbacks have made me a better person and stronger because I have tried to learn from them and grow, and I have chosen not to be bitter and angry. One incident in my youth caused me to reflect on many aspects of being human. Out of that self-reflection, I grew a newer, wiser, better version of myself, and I began to embrace those close to me with a hug. Upon returning home to Maine to visit my parents one weekend, I left with a hug. Not knowing how it would be received, I was ever so nervous. To my surprise and delight, it was met with overwhelming acceptance. From that moment on, hugs would be part of me.

Shortly after being raised at Moriah Lodge No. 15, I had the occasion to be at a local breakfast sponsored by Moosup Lodge No. 113. Being unsure of myself and how I fit into this new fraternity, I was cautious and respectful of my greetings. As I was introduced to two brothers from Rhode Island, they greeted me, whom they had never seen before, with a welcoming handshake and a hug. This fraternal greeting meshed so perfectly with who I was; I felt so at home. Those two brothers from Rhode Island who impacted my future journey were the late RWB Robert Sweet and the late Past Grand Master Russel Davis. Our friendship only strengthened over time.


At all possible opportunities, I now try to greet all brothers, family, and friends with a hug that I love to give. I heard once say that a hug completes us as humans. We each have our heart on the left side of our body, but with a hug, there is a heart on both sides, making the hug a completion of the souls.

For the past year, the Connecticut Freemasons has not been mailed to approximately half of all brothers in Connecticut, and judging from some emails I received, hardly any of the other jurisdictions who normally would have received it. The budget adjustments voted at the Semi-Annual Communication in October 2023 meant that only brothers over 70 years of age would receive the paper by U.S. Mail. Brothers under 70 who were boosters would also find the Connecticut Freemasons in the mailbox each month. All the rest were expected to find it electronically.

From the amount and regularity of the emails I received, usually starting like "*Hi*, *I haven't seen the paper in my mailbox in a while*, *and was wondering*...," it was clear that word did not travel fast... or at all. It certainly didn't travel to other jurisdictions – they're not on our email list, and any of the announcements made in the paper would have been pretty impossible to read when they weren't actually receiving the paper. Places like the Masonic Library and Museum of Pennsylvania were left wondering where the newspaper was.

But based on the budget voted last October, the newspaper is back. Beginning with this May issue, it should regularly appear in mailboxes across the state and in those other jurisdictions to which the news of Connecticut Masonry has regularly been mailed in the past.

It goes without saying that the newspaper is always available on the Grand Lodge website (the most recent editions appear under the fold on the page), and there are links to more than 10 years of back issues. If you missed anything this past year, you can always pop in there and look.

If you like the newspaper, and if you missed it during the past year, consider becoming a booster. Those contributions do help immensely, but of course, it is no longer required that you become a booster to receive a hard copy. And perhaps consider advertising your services in the paper as well. We tend to think of the publication as only serving Connecticut but believe me, there are other jurisdictions out there that receive it as well, and depending on what you do and advertise, you never know who will see it and have a need.

In the meantime, keep an eye out for the familiar newspaper appearing in your mailbox. And to paraphrase the immortal words of Randy Quaid as Russell Casse in *Independence Day*, "Hello boys! We're BACK!!!"

Masonicare's CareConnect Navigator

Navigating the complexities of health and senior care services can leave one feeling exhausted, frustrated, or just plain lost.

Masonicare's CareConnect Navigator program helps individuals through the process of acquiring care and services for themselves or a loved one. A **complimentary** service available to the Masonic Family and the general public, CareConnect Navigator was borne out of an idea from Bro. Joseph J. Porco, MWPGM, following his own challenges as the primary caregiver for an aging parent.

Audrey Grove, who spent nearly a decade with Masonicare Community Services, is Director of the CareConnect Navigator program. She describes her role as taking the work she was doing previously "to the next level."

"What's wonderful about CareConnect Navigator," she said, "is that it fits so well with the Masonicare mission. It's a resource for people outside of Masonicare to ask questions about anything related to senior healthcare or senior living. When someone contacts CareConnect Navigator, they reach someone who is completely focused on their needs and who can provide recommendations or connect them with services that may or may not be offered by Masonicare. And there is no cost involved."

Audrey notes that CareConnect Navigator is often utilized by adult children seeking to identify services for a parent and seniors concerned about the well-being of a spouse. In many cases, there is a medical crisis creating a greater sense of urgency.

"At any age," she said, "this process can be stressful and even scary. It makes me really happy to be able to bring people peace of mind."

In addition to overseeing CareConnect Navigator, Audrey also facilitates support groups at Masonicare and is organizing a Health, Wellness, and Community Resource Fair to be held on Grand Masters Day (Saturday, June 8) on our Wallingford campus. It will be under its own tent and feature representatives from local healthcare providers and senior services agencies.

• Lab Services: Griffin Health's state-of-the-art laboratory facility will provide improved community access to diagnostic testing and screening, from routine blood work to specialized tests. In addition to Griffin Health's freestanding lab, it will provide in-home lab services for residents of Masonicare on an as-needed basis and oversee all laboratory diagnostic testing at Masonicare Health Center and Masonicare Behavioral Health Hospital.

• Radiology Services: Located adjacent to lab services, Griffin Health will provide low-dose digital X-ray/radiology services. These services are open to the public, as well as Masonicare residents and employees.

• Occupational Health: Available by appointment only, Griffin's Occupational Health Services are tailored to meet the needs of both employers and employees. Available to Masonicare and other area businesses, the clinic offers pre-employment screenings, workplace injury management, health promotion programs, and other services.

We are excited about this partnership with Griffin Health and the addition of new services on our Wallingford campus because they will not only benefit our patients, residents, and employees but also contribute to the overall health and wellness of our surrounding businesses and communities.

A couple of months ago, I shared with you that Masonicare's Chief Financial Officer, Bro. Steve Beaulieu will be retiring at the end of March. However, Steve has graciously agreed to stay on as Interim CFO, giving us more time to find an ideal successor. I am grateful to Steve for his willingness to delay

Washington Bible to Visit Temple Lodge No. 65



provided his closely guarded, family-secret recipe below. In full disclosure, while not precisely Bro. Weber's world-renowned winning chili recipe, it is a recipe that is sure to win you accolades at home or with any party guests:

Ingredients:

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 chipotle peppers in adobo sauce
- 1 (10 ounce) can diced tomatoes with green chile peppers
- 2 (15 ounce) cans kidney beans, drained and rinsed
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 3/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 3 teaspoons hot pepper sauce
- 1/4 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Chipotle peppers can be found in the Mexican specialty aisle of the supermarket or at a Latin grocer. Make sure to purchase the chipotle peppers in the can with Adobo Sauce. If you don't want it too spicy, reduce the hot sauce and chili powder.

Directions:

• In a large sauté pan, brown ground beef with onion, chipotle peppers and 3 tablespoons of the adobo sauce; drain well.

• In a large stock pot, combine the beef mixture, stewed tomatoes, kidney beans, Kosher salt, ground cumin, garlic powder, and chili powder. At this point, adjust to taste with hot pepper sauce. Heat through and serve garnished with Cheddar cheese.








Masonry was well represented by these fine brothers that evening and indeed brought great pride to Anchor Lodge and the 7th Masonic District.

The First St. James Lodge No. 23 Meeting Place by Greg Webster

The Grand Lodge of Connecticut chartered St. James Lodge No. 23 on May 18, 1793.

Brother Calvin Barstow owned the stately Georgian Colonial house at the intersection of Northwest Corner Road and Amos Road in Preston. The brothers of St. James Lodge met for the next 19 years in the beautiful second-floor rooms.

In 1786, Bro. Calvin bought "between 1 and two acres" from Adam Stanton. Construction of the Barstow House, as it became known, started in 1792 and ultimately completed in 1800. The house was 40 feet by 30 feet and constructed around a central chimney, which was common for the period. The framing was done with heavy oak timbers over 14 inches wide.

All the rooms in the house were detailed with fine colonial craftsmanship, including beautiful chair rails, wainscoting, inside shutters with hearts cut into the panels, fireplaces, and decorative moldings. Bro. Calvin's son Joshua, a blacksmith, made many fine hardware items throughout the house.

The two rooms on the second floor are the most interesting. The south end is one large room with an arched ceiling – "a beautiful room. This is the old Masonic Hall, the

birthplace of St. James Lodge, now of Norwich (Somerset-St. James Lodge No. 34). This room has a beautifully detailed chair rail and fireplace. The northwest

room has its original decorative stenciling on the floor around the border of the room and a Masonic emblem, an eight-pointed star, in the center of the room.

A simple picket fence and a stone retaining wall originally set off the exterior of the property. A set of stone steps led from Amos Road up to the front of the house. Today, in front of the stone retaining wall stands a stone marker that reads: "Birthplace of St. James Lodge No. 23 A.F. & A.M. Chartered May 18, 1793."

It is noteworthy to mention that General and Bro. Samuel Mott, who served under General George Washington, was a charter member of St. James Lodge and lived on his own property next door to the Barstow House.



If you would consider supporting this Masonic Family Day




