

# John A. Amarilios, Bol of John A. Amarilios, Personal Transformation

It's always interesting to see how brothers are affected by degrees that they view for the very first time. Rarely do we get correspondence from a brother who is so profoundly affected by what he has seen at a Scottish Rite Theater. Brother James W. D'Acosta took time out to write down his impressions. Here are his impressions after watching the 14th degree on Wednesday, October 11, 2006 in Waterbury, Connecticut:

I find myself in a converted church for the 14th Degree. I see pews and can easily tell where generations of choir members sang hymns, anthems, and dirges. I wonder whether the congregation prospered and moved to a larger site or withered and left their dead in a forgotten graveyard? I realize that buildings are more transitory than their bricks and mortar appear. Buildings serve people. When people move, buildings stay behind providing the community with an echo of the past. Dinner reminds me of Christian's, a favorite restaurant in New Orleans that serves its soft-shelled crabs in a former sanctuary.

Two blue lodges make use of the building for regular meetings, and a principal charity of this Scottish Rite Valley is housed next door. The 32nd Degree Masonic Learning Center for Children provides tutoring for dyslexic children. My reading is slowed as I pause to distinguish lower case "b's" from "d's." Children with crippling levels of this malady must find school intensely frustrating and life as adults very difficult in our highly literate society. This is a wonderful charity.

Props include the 10 Commandments and the Ark of the Covenant. I inch forward as the Ark comes into view and recall the magnificent model displayed at the George Washington Masonic National Memorial in Alexandria, Virginia. Few objects from antiquity are subjects of such awe.

Bread and wine are passed. I am uncomfortable. The brotherhood and virtue commended is not in conflict with the Gospel, but it is not the same as claiming to be blood and body in a religious ceremony. The contrast is heightened by

the use of the same tray and plate of individual cups of wine and small servings of white bread as used in many Protestant communion services. Is this an attack on a familiar symbol? I listen closely. We are called to behave as brothers. There is no dogma here. Trust in God. Enjoy the gift of life. Help those in need. Live in peace.

This night I am one of three candidates. One speaks with the heavy accent of an eastern European language I can't distinguish. The other brother, visiting from Hartford, is accompanied by an officer of his Consistory and is a different African American man than I met in the 4th Degree. We are treated to equal measures of warmth and sincere welcome. The current political debate over immigration and the persistent remnants of prejudice holds no currency here.

Rain makes driving conditions dangerous as I leave. I left my glasses at home and now try my prescription sun glasses. Within moments I nearly hit another car. I throw off my sun glasses and squint for the remainder of my trip. I place my trust in God. "There are no atheists in fox holes," wrote Stephen Ambrose describing soldiers on the front lines during WW II. Danger prompts prayer.

Other images push their way into my mind's eye. Tonight, I examined the bylaws book of the Valley of Waterbury. This book contains the signatures of every member since 1897. Graceful strokes of fountain pens dominate the early decades and notations in pencil give death notices in the margins. Men have come together here for over 100 years. The building has changed, but the ideals of Masonry ever call men to mutual support in making themselves and society better.

I wasn't the only one who forgot something that evening; Tom Kozlowski, my brother candidate from Poland, forgot his wallet. His face became radiant as he described the joy of handling his 4-month-old grandchild just before our meeting. New life overtook his regular cares. God called, I believe, reminding him of the beauty and goodness of life and the promise of immortality.

## THE REBIS: A SYMJohn A. Amarilios, BOLOF John A. Amarilios, Personal Transformation

W.M.: What are you here to do?

S.W.: To learn to subdue my passions and improve myself in Masonry.

The illustration of the Rebis first appeared in an alchemical text entitled "Azoth of the Philosophers," written by Basil Valentine in 1613. The Rebis is the successful final product of a personal alchemical transformation. Its meaning is derived from the Latin for "double matter." Personal transformation is a slow, steadfast regimen that involves several different steps through which the proverbial rough stone is fashioned into a finished one. This endeavor, often referred to as "The Great Work," involves the awakening of the slumbering eternal Master within, so that it establishes primacy over the temporary personality with which it shares the bodily vehicle for the current lifetime.

The Rebis represents the finished product after one has gone thru the processes of putrefaction and purification, which entails separating two opposing qualities and then reuniting them. Putrefaction alludes to the burning out of the dross and impure,

while purification reunites them in a clean and unsullied form. This Rebis represents the reunited opposites after they have been "cleaned up." Anciently this was referred to as the divine "Hermaphrodite."

The five planetary glyphs represent the influence that the heavenly orbs bear upon the qualities being transformed. The sun and the moon allude to the male and female potentialities, while the glyph for Mercury is found between the two heads. Mercury works as the divine communicator allowing the male and female potentialities to communicate and understand their need for balance and the division of responsibility in the work.



The Rebis figure stands on a circle that encompasses a triangle and a square. The triangle alludes to spirituality, and the square alludes to terrestrial materiality—major points on a compass and the seasons. The two added together equal seven, which is a number of completions, as in the number of days it took deity to fashion the world per the Great Light. The Rebis holds two working tools, the compass (for drawing circles and alluding to the spiritual) and the square for drawing right angles in squares or rectangles, thus alluding to the world of material endeavor. The fire-breathing dragon below alludes to the transformative nature of heat. The dragon in alchemical literature often represents the element of Sulphur, which is instrumental in the process of merging the material with the spiritual. We can thus see that some of the symbolism employed by Freemasonry can be found in the cloudy mists of the old alchemical tradition of the Middle Ages.

## Two Cents on Pike's 14th Chapter, "Grand Elect, Perfect, and Sublime Mason," in *Morals and Dogma*:

There is enough heresy here against Catholic dogma to condemn a man to burn at the stake. I can picture a papal functionary peering greedily into the eyes of a defendant reciting Masonic philosophy: "Masonry, around whose altars the Christian, the Hebrew, the Moslem, the Brahmin, the followers of Confucius and Zoroaster, can assemble as brethren and unite in prayer to the one God who is above all the Baalim, must needs leave it to each of its initiates to look for the foundation of his faith and hope to the written scriptures of his own religion" (226). And then there is: "He is our Father; and we are all brethren" (227). Well, spread the charcoal briquettes, throw a match on the lighter fluid, grab the hot dogs, and get the party going!

I am thankful that men took action long ago to end the Inquisition, but I am aware of similar intolerance today. My brother-in-law, a conservative Christian, quit Masonry because of its universality. An Imam at a Mosque in Bridgeport said Buddhists are idolaters condemned to the hell fire, although a Buddhist monk in a temple a few buildings away made clear to me that Buddhists do not worship the myriad images of

Buddha proliferating their temples, homes, work sites, and public spaces. The nightly news carries examples of religious fanatics slaughtering non-believers. I am also thankful for our secret modes of recognition because danger depends more on local circumstances than on history.
