#### GRAND LODGE A.F. & A.M. of CONNECTICUT October 19, 2024

The 2024 Regular Semi-Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Connecticut will be held in the auditorium of **The Hartog Activities Center at Ashlar Village on the Masonicare Campus in Wallingford, Connecticut, on Saturday, October 19, 2024.** You will need to follow the instructions of the Security Staff for parking. You may enter from either Cheshire Road or from Masonic Avenue. Bus transportation will be provided as necessary. **Please note that the Masonicare Campus is a 100% smoke-free facility.** 

The formal opening will begin promptly at 9:00 a.m.. Recommended arrival time is 8 a.m.. Please note it is anticipated that the session may extend slightly beyond noon, but it will conclude by 12:30 P.M.

This **Regular Communication** is called for the purpose of electing Grand Lodge Officers for the year 2025. In addition, we will receive certain committee reports, act on any legislative changes which may be for consideration and other issues, time permitting, as directed by the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brother Edward C. Page. Section 8203 of our Masonic Law does permit action on changes to the Rules and Regulations which are raised from the floor or motions presented in Committee Reports at the meeting without prior notice to the craft.

The Pending legislation items may be published in the September 2024 issue of *Connecticut Freemasons*. Please bring the appropriate reference material with you to the meeting. Limited copies will be available. The current committee reports (October 2024) will be posted on the Grand Lodge membership system (Grand View).


Registration of delegates will begin at 8:00 A.M. All brothers attending must present a 2024 paper or virtual dues card upon entering the tiled lodge. All voting delegates must register at the registration table. Registration will be by Lodge number as designated by posted signs in the area.

Should you not be able to attend in person as a principal officer of your Lodge or should you wish to proxy your vote representing your Lodge so you can vote on your own behalf, if eligible, please fill out a proxy form that will be mailed to you under separate cover. If your proxy form is not properly filled out and signed by you, it will not be accepted at the session. <u>Each officer, or his proxy, should bring the appropriate apron and jewel of his respective office.</u> Sections 2300 and 2301 of our Rules and Regulations state that a Roll of Lodges will occur early in the opening of the session. <u>Proxy forms will be emailed directly to the lodge officers.</u>

# "Historic" Uniting of Masonicare, United Methodist Homes Enters Next Phase

# Delegates to Semi-Annual Meeting Will Vote to Amend Masonicare Bylaws

In May, Masonicare announced that it was forming a strategic alliance with United Methodist Homes (UMH) with the goal of merging two legacy, nonprofit providers of senior healthcare and retirement living.

Founded in 1874, 21 years before the Masonic Home (now Masonicare Health Center) opened in Wallingford, UMH provides independent living, assisted living, short-term rehab, and skilled nursing services. In addition to its campuses in Newington, Shelton, and Farmington, UMH also has its own consulting company that works with senior living communities across the U.S.

Under the terms of this agreement, UMH and all of its locations and business lines will become part of Masonicare, strengthening the delivery of care and services for thousands of residents and patients.

"This represents a historic expansion of Masonicare's healthcare and residential services," said RWB Christopher J. Earle, Chairman of Masonicare's Board of Trustees, "while creating exciting growth opportunities for our home and community-based services. It also better positions Masonicare for long-term sustainability, which, for a nonprofit healthcare provider, is absolutely essential."

"In United Methodist Homes, Masonicare has truly found a 'kindred spirit' that considers it a privilege to care for seniors with dignity and compassion," said Bro. Edward C. Page, Most Worshipful Grand Master. "The entire Masonic Family should be delighted that Masonicare's important work will continue in a manner that stays true to its mission and values."

Masonicare's President and CEO, WB Jon-Paul Venoit, visited all the Masonic Districts in the state with RWB Earle and other key members of Masonicare's Board of Trustees and senior management team to share details about the alliance and planned merger with UMH and how it will benefit all those in our care.

"The feedback I've received so far has been overwhelmingly positive," he said. "The Masonic Family has heard me say for years that the key to weathering changes in our industry rests in Masonicare's ability to adapt and grow. Bringing an organization of the caliber of United Methodist Homes under the umbrella of Masonicare certainly accomplishes that."

The next step in this process will require some changes to Masonicare's corporate bylaws. At the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Connecticut in October, delegates will be asked to vote on four proposed amendments:

- 1. Masonicare's Board of Trustees would increase from 15 to 17 members.
- 2. The two new board members would be "Strategic Trustees" specific to the UMH merger for a maximum of nine years.
- 3. These Strategic Trustees would serve three consecutive three-year terms, just like all other Trustees.
- 4. The Strategic Trustees would not be replaced if their seats are vacated due to death, resignation, or other causes.

All delegates will receive a copy of the proposed changes to review before a vote is taken. Pending all necessary approvals, the merger will be completed in early 2025.





# Grand Chaplain's Pulpit by The Rev. Bruce R. Bellmore, PGM

#### "Diversity of opinion; unity of purpose"

This past summer, I visited

Abbott Hall in Marblehead, Massachusetts, and saw the well-known painting called "The Spirit of '76." This magnificent painting, which is approximately 10 feet tall, has become a part of the fabric of American lore. While most of us think of it as a Revolutionary War painting, it is actually a Civil War-themed painting. It was commissioned for the Centennial in 1876. It depicts a wounded Union Soldier in the foreground, praying that the spirit of 1776 that founded this country reunite it after the schism and division of the War Between the States. The three prominent figures, the drummer, fifer, and flag bearer, are depicted as spirits with their feet not touching the ground—an ode to unity after great separation.

Recently, the Supreme Court of the United States completed its session for this year, and, as always, there is considerable diversity of opinion on the rulings. The most controversial ruling during this past session was undeniably the Presidential Immunity ruling. Social media was ablaze after this ruling was announced, with opinions both pro and con regarding the decision.

What I found particularly interesting was the wide range of opinions expressed by my brothers on these rulings. Some of my brothers felt that this decision was a vindication of the Constitution, while other brothers thought that this was a very dark day for American jurisprudence. History and experience will be the true judge of the extent and effect of this ruling. I will not comment on the ruling as it is not my place as Chaplain to all my brothers to express an opinion in this column.

I will comment on how interesting it is to see brothers so diametrically opposed on this and other issues united in the principles and purposes

of Freemasonry; brothers from the same lodge who disagree vehemently on social issues working side by side to accomplish any task in and for the lodge.

It is one of the time-honored principles of Freemasonry that sectarian discussions and discussions of a political nature are kept outside the lodge and so it should be. We meet in the lodge on the level of equality and unity in the principles of brotherly love, relief, and truth. We regard each other not based on outward appearances but on inner qualities. We come together not as Republicans, Democrats, Progressives, Liberals, or Conservatives but as a Brotherhood of Men under the Fatherhood of God.

In 1776, a group of men, many of whom were Freemasons, gathered in Philadelphia to discuss the fate of the Colonies. Many of them were British Loyalists; many were Colonists. We now refer to all of them as patriots. These men had diverse opinions on inherent human rights, freedom, liberty, and slavery. They argued and disagreed on nearly every subject. But after discussion and turmoil, they joined together in unity of purpose and ratified the Declaration of Independence. They set aside their personal opinions and stood together to declare their freedom from tyranny and injustice and begin uniting these diverse colonies into the United States of America. A country founded on the belief that despite our differences, we are united. The motto of our country "E Pluribus Unum" which translates "Out of many – One" beautifully illustrates this principle.

We, too, have an opportunity to stand together in unity. Let us agree to disagree, rationally and forthrightly discuss our differences of opinion, and seek to come to a unity of purpose as Freemasons. Let us never forget the obligations we have taken, keep our principles ever before us, and stand united in the bonds of Brotherhood.

# Grand Historian's Corner

I hope you have enjoyed your summer hiatus with your families, friends and all the fun activities that the summer months usually bring.

I start by relating an event/program I started in my lodge. In 2017-2018, I was searching for more enlightenment and a deeper understanding while striving to strengthen my Masonic foundation. An idea flashed in front of my eyes, and I had my answer. I would develop a program on what I soon called "What is Masonry?" laying the foundation, strengthening it, and making it ready to build my temple.

I started with the following topics: In the beginning, Masonry, when, where, and how; The commandments of ancient sages; The Ancient Landmarks; The constitution of our Grand Lodge; How is the Grand Lodge organized; Statement of principles; The badge of a Mason; Rights, duties, and charges; Proceedings; Protocol when in a lodge assembled-the dos and don'ts along with many other subjects, including the three degrees with their symbolism and the ritual, all which aid in building our Masonic foundation.

I announced to the brothers that the program would be held on the fourth Thursday of each month. A bit apprehensive, I was overwhelmed when 13 brothers arrived that evening. Over the next two years, 22 brothers were involved. Then, the "pandemic" arrived and ended my program.

I learned and reinforced what I already knew. My brothers were most desirous of Masonic education.

Over the last 50 years, many studies have sought data on this subject. Here are the answers to the question in one such solicitation.

A compilation of these men's answers reveals that something is lost or lacking in their lives. They are deeply personal and extraordinarily revealing about the man who decides to come to us as a candidate for the degrees of Masonry. Their answers now need to be heard and carefully listened to.

Why did you petition and subsequently join the Fraternity of Freemasons?

- I am searching for enrichment and maturity in my life...
- I want a sense of purpose and belonging to something that is rewarding and exciting...
- I am desirous to meet new people of my own type...
- I want to be a better part of society...
- I wish to be valid and become a better man...

- I am looking for something different...
- I am interested in understanding your history and its symbolism...
- I want something else from all the other stuff that's out there...
- It's a family matter. I'm following my dad...
- It's a question of fulfillment and being part of something historical...
- I don't know why, but I wanted to do it...
- Making it sound serious was good, but I was left with the feeling of wanting much more...
- It meant something to me. I can't quite grasp it, but I now need more...
- I liked the order and surprise aspects...
- The history bit is significant...
- I want to be involved in something older than my country...
- I like the mystery of it all...
- I think it is a window to my soul...

Do any of the answers ring a bell for you? Education can defend the Fraternity from future atrophy. Education, knowledge, and rituals are our best defenses against decay. Knowledge is power. This is why nations and the business world spy upon one another.

Where is our Lodge of Education? Our Grand Lodge CME provides enlightening programs. Are they enough? Education and knowledge, spread out over time, will change into wisdom. Wisdom is more than both—much more—because it embraces behavior action.

The upcoming 28th Dgree on September 23 explains the spiritual modality of alchemy. The degree posits what alchemy is and what it is not. It's an important degree that expounds the Scottish Rite's core value of Personal Integrity. William Penn's quote above pertains not only to tyrants of the political and physical realms but also to the tyrants of our internal passions, which reside within and drive most of humanity to unhappy life events brought on by hate, lust, gluttony, jealousy, and so on.

The French philosopher Pierre de Chardin once asked, "Who are you really?" Bro. Albert Einstein answered the question as follows: "We are slowed down sound and light waves, a walking bundle of frequencies tuned into the cosmos. We are souls dressed up in sacred biochemical garments, and our bodies are the instruments through which our souls play their music." The reality is that most of the time, we get caught up in our physical bodies, and we forget who and what we really are. The discovery of who and what we truly are - this great awakening is our primary mission while we traverse the physical plane of existence.

While living in this faulty and imperfect house of clay, our personal mission is to discover and give life to our real selves. When we undertake



# RWB Shane Dufresne Receives Pierpont Edwards Medal In Bronze

RWB Shane Dufresne was born on February 7, 1968, to Robert and Marylene (Dube) Dufresne. He has one sister, Nicole Dufresne, and a son, Drew Dufresne. He also has two nieces, four nephews, one grand niece, and one grand nephew. He was educated in Waterbury and graduated from Sacred Heart High School in 1986.

Shane started working as a Foreman for the City of Waterbury Parks Department on July 25, 1988. He was hired by the Waterbury Police Department on December 12, 1997. After graduating from the Connecticut Police Academy on April 14, 1998, Shane was assigned to the midnight shift in the Patrol Division. In June 2003, he transferred from Patrol to the Community Relations Division, where he worked until March 9, 2005. The police department received letters of

thanks and appreciation from the community for Shane's work in the Bunker Hill section of Waterbury. He was then reassigned to a special assignment attached to the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration, New England Field Division, as an undercover narcotics officer. In March 2006, Shane was promoted to the rank of Detective. As a Detective, he first ran the department's Police Athletic League (PAL). After a short time, he was reassigned to the main



Detective Division. In September 2008, he was assigned to the Youth Bureau before retiring from the Waterbury Police Department in 2009. During his career at the Waterbury Police Department, he received numerous commendation awards. After retiring, Shane immediately began a new career with Western Connecticut State University Police Department, where he worked until he joined the Plainville Police Department on November 23, 2015. He is currently assigned as the School Resource Officer (SRO) for the Middle School of Plainville.

Brother Shane held several community roles in Waterbury. He was President of the Bunker Hill Sports Association for five years, where he coached several teams. He was also a Cub Scout and Boy Scout leader for Pack 20 and Troop 40 at Blessed Sacrament School, where he coached the baseball team for six years.

For the last seven years, Shane has shared his life and made his home with his longtime girlfriend Michelle Suttenberg and their two Labrador Retrievers, Raven and Max.

Shane began his Masonic career upon being initiated as an Entered Apprentice in Harmony Lodge No. 42 in Waterbury on April 18, 2002. He was passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on May 16, 2002, and raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason on June 20, 2002, both at Harmony Lodge No. 42. He entered the officer line at Harmony as Senior Steward in 2004, progressing to the East where he served as Harmony's Worshipful Master in 2009. WB Shane also served Harmony Lodge No. 42 as Treasurer from 2012 to 2014 and Almoner in 2017. Brother Shane was awarded the Robert S. Walker MWPGM Award as the Mason of the Year for Harmony Lodge No. 42 on November 7, 2013. He received the P.M. Jeter Hines Community Service Award from Kellogg No. 5 Prince Hall in April 2010. Brother Shane served as President of the 3rd District Blue Lodge Council for three years. He has been active as an organizer and participant in numerous events, both Masonic and non-Masonic, to assist those in need.

Shane was commissioned as Right Worshipful District Deputy of the Grand Lodge AF & AM of Connecticut for District 3A in 2010-2011 and reappointed for 2011-2012. He was appointed Grand Marshal for 2014-2015 and Grand Almoner from 2015 through 2019. In 2019, he was appointed Grand Junior Steward and has served in the progressive Grand Lodge line since then, being elected as Grand Senior Warden for the 2024-2025 Masonic year. He has also served on various Grand Lodge committees, namely Action Programs from 2005 through 2007, Community Action from April 2019-April 2023, EMR Committee 2019 to present, Ritual and Ceremonies Committee from 2023 to present, and Budget and Finance from July 2023 to present.

Apart from Blue Lodge, Shane has been a member of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley of Waterbury, and the Lafayette Consistory in Stratford since June 2003. He has attended all of the 29 AASR degrees. He is also a member of Pyramid Shrine No. 9, AAONMS in Stratford. He is a member of the York Rite bodies in Meriden, Keystone Chapter No. 6 of Royal Arch Masons, Hamilton Council No. 9 Royal and Select Masters of Connecticut, and of St. Elmo Commandery No. 9, Grand Commandery Knights Templar of Connecticut, having been knighted on May 22, 2009. He is also a member of the Zindah Grotto in Waterbury.

In recognition of his service to our fraternity, his lodge and his community, the most worshipful grand lodge, ancient free and accepted masons of the state of Connecticut is pleased to present right worshipful brother Shane Dufresne, the Pierpont Edwards Medal in Bronze for Distinguished Masonic Service.

# The Broadway Masonic Temple, Norwich CT by Greg Webster

The idea of a home for the Masonic bodies of Norwich originated in December, 1881, when Somerset Lodge No. 34 and St. James Lodge No. 23 directed their trustees to invest \$300 for that purpose.

In 1890 a large building, the Shannon building, was under construction at the corner of Shetucket and Main Streets. The feeling that Masonry should have a more convenient place for its meetings than the Masonic hall on Water Street seemed to have a chance of fulfillment. The several York Rite bodies also appointed committees to consider the subject.

These committees, with the presiding officers of the several bodies, met in the St. James Lodge room on Monday, October 6, 1890, electing Arthur H. Brewer chairman and Charles B. Chapman secretary. Several meetings were held, and at one time it seemed almost settled that a lease would be taken on the upper floor of the Shannon building, at an annual rental of \$1500. But as that sum represented a capitalization at 5% of \$30,000.00, it was finally decided, almost unani-mously, that it would be better for the fraternity to erect its own building. At a meeting of the committee held on June 15, 1891, the following was passed:


"That the several committees report to their respective bodies that they are of the opinion that the lease of the fifth floor of the Shannon building is not advisable, and would ask for further pow-er to consider the advisability of purchasing and owning property for their purposes."


The "further power" was granted.


Thus in 1893 the Masonic Temple was built at 95 Broadway across from Norwich City Hall. On April 17, 1893, the Building Committee held a ground breaking ceremony at the site. On March 23, 1894, the new temple was completed and handed over formally to the Masonic Temple Corp. Ill. Bro. Arthur H. Brewer, 33rd Degree, was the first President. The Temple was used until the larger temple was built at Washington and Sachem Streets in 1928. The Broadway Temple was sold to the American Legion and was unfortunately destroyed by fire in 1958. It was razed and is now a parking lot.

The Broadway Masonic Temple in Norwich is reputed to be the first building in the world erected by Masons exclusively for Masonry. (Pub. By Masonic Temple Corp., Norwich, CT, 1921.)




## St. Alban's Lodge No. 38 Presents 50-Year Pin by Colin Souney






During 2023, under the cloak of darkness, supplies found their way to the base of Drummer's Rock. One after another,


