Notables of Valley of Bridgeport Lafayette Consistory

A series of articles reviewing the accomplishments of the Valley's members in various facets of life in bygone eras ~ Claudia Farkas

The Educators: Part 4

In this fourth article in the series of notable Masons who were part of Valley of Bridgeport Lafayette Consistory, we meet educators who became famous far beyond their respective Valleys.

Their stories are based on information found in their archived petitions, membership cards and obituaries.

Hiram Bingham III (1875-1956)

was the son of a missionary, born in Hawaii. He was an explorer, Yale professor

and a politician. He is recognized as discovering the forgotten city of Machu Picchu during a 1911 expedition in Peru. It has been suggested that he was the inspiration for the character Indiana Jones. He was elected Governor of Connecticut in 1924, was sworn into office and resigned a part day to take his sect in the

the next day to take his seat in the U.S. Senate, where he served from

1925-1933. Hiram Bingham was raised in Hiram Lodge New Haven in 1914, was a member of the Valley of New Haven and York Rite Bodies, was knighted at New Haven Commandery No. 2 in 1915, and became a 32nd Degree Mason in Lafayette Consistory, Bridgeport in 1916.

George Victor Larson (1895-1952) was the founder and president of the Larson College for Women in Hamden. Founded as a business school, it became a Junior College, then a Liberal Arts and Science Senior College. In 1952 Quinnipiac College assumed control of the school and today the original Larson College building in Hamden is an assisted living facility. The Larson name lives on at Quinnipiac University's Mt. Carmel campus as a residence hall. George Larson was raised in Wooster Lodge No. 79 New Haven in 1929 and was a member of the Valley of New Haven as well as New Haven York Rite, New Haven Commandery No. 2, and Lafayette Consistory in Bridgeport. He became a 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason in 1930.

Harry Clinton Post (1868-1961) began his teaching career in a one-room schoolhouse in upstate New York. He moved to Waterbury in 1896 to become the principal of a business school which he purchased within a year, becoming its president. He renamed it Waterbury Business College although it was commonly called Post's Waterbury Business College. In 1931 it was officially named Post College, then Post Junior College of Commerce, then Teikyo Post University and finally, today's Post University. A member of the Scottish Rite Bodies of the Valley of Waterbury, he was raised in Continental Lodge No. 76 in 1907, was a Charter member of Liberty Lodge No. 123 Waterbury (1918), Clark Commandery No. 7, and received his 32nd Degree at Lafayette Consistory in 1920.

Charles Phineas Sherman (1874-1962) was a professor of Roman Law and Canon Law at Yale and other well-known colleges. He is best known for writing "Roman Law in the Modern World". A member of the Valley of New Haven and York Rite Bodies in New Haven, he was raised a Master Mason in 1904 at Trumbull Lodge No. 22 New Haven, was knighted in New Haven Commandery No. 2 in 1905, and in 1907 became a 32nd Degree Mason and member of Lafayette Consistory, Bridgeport.

Charles (Chuck) Toros Avedisian (1917-1983) played pro football as a right guard with the New York Giants from 1942-1944 while also serving in the military as a Marine in WWII. Following his playing days, he became a biology teacher and then had a long career as athletic director for the New Britain and Darien public school systems. He is in the Providence College Athletic Hall of Fame and the New Britain Connecticut Sports Hall of Fame. Avedisian contributed to football strategy in his development of the unbalanced T formation. He was raised in Centennial Lodge No. 118 in New Britain in 1960, was a Scottish Rite member of the Valley of New Haven and became a 32nd Degree Mason and Lafayette Consistory member in 1961.
















A GREAT DAY FOR THE TURKEY TROT

Pythagoras and the 47th Problem of Euclid

The 47th Problem of Euclid, which was solved by the ancient sage Pythagoras, as illustrated below, features prominently in much Past Master's Regalia. The answer to the problem which is foundational to modern geometry is that in every right angle triangle, the square of the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the two other sides. So if the square described on one side of a triangle is equal to the sum of the square of the other two sides, one can be assured that a right angle exists between the other two sides.


This is fundamental in all civil engineering work today, as it has enabled engineers to reliably and accurately construct structures such as (but not limited to) tunnels, roads, and bridges. It is also a basic underpinning in a myriad of disciplines such as Astronomy, Navigation and Mathematics.

Myth has it that when Pythagoras found the resolution to this reality he yelled out "Eureka" ("I found it" in Greek). So who was Pythagoras and why is he so respected by Speculative Masonry? He was an astronomer, philosopher and mathematician, who around 518 B.C. founded a Mystery school in Crotona, Italy. He was an accomplished athlete who was also accredited with performing miracles. His teachings were followed avidly by other giants of the ancient era such

as Aristotle, Plato and Socrates. Most importantly, he was a firm proponent of the immortality of the soul.

Although his teachings were not recorded in written documents, many of his followers did transcribe his teachings into writing. Modern day Masonic lodges and their veiled and allegorical teachings are structured and laid out in sympathy with those of his society. The philosophy he taught in the Fifth Century B.C. is almost identical to that which is expounded in modern day Freemasonry.


The 47th Problem of Euclid in many ways symbolizes the personal quality of Perseverance. This quality is what Freemasons, who yearn and search for the Truth in Masonic Light, employ in their search. The great Truths that lay quietly and unseen in our symbolism and our Blue Lodge ritual entail great effort and diligence to uncover. It requires study, effort and time. It requires a nascent desire, blossoming into motivation and then legwork and research to understand what is being imparted in our Ritual. The path leads to a liberation from the dross of the Material world to the one of effulgent Hope and Liberation, regardless of the circumstances in which the world finds itself.
