Be Prepared!

I recently saw a video, shot on cell phone and Ring doorbell, of the beginning of one of the Los Angeles wildfires, which started at the base of a high-tension power line tower. It was across the canyon from the home of the couple shooting the video, and the high winds were already whipping sparks through the air. From the agitated cries of the people filming, they clearly understood the dangerous situation, even though the fire was still on the other side of the canyon. Within 20 minutes or so, they had grabbed everything of importance from their house that they could take and were in their car driving off. Clearly, they were very prepared for such a moment.

When my father was dying, in his last days, I asked him where his DD-214 form from the Navy was. I knew I'd need that after he laid down his working tools. It's with the important papers in such and such a drawer, he told me. The only problem was that it was not there when my brother and I were looking for it. We did find it, with another cache of important papers, perhaps that he had been working on, so all was not lost. My dad was pretty prepared, but in the somewhat chaotic run-up to his final trip to the hospital and later hospice care, he'd been unable to return those papers to the others.

As we are often told in Masonic ritual, we never know when our working tools will fall from our nerveless grasp. In addition to important papers, we, as Masons, also have a Masonic tradition that surrounds our demise. The location of our apron, our wishes for a Masonic service, and even that part of our obituary that lists in which bodies we have labored and perhaps our titles within those bodies are all items that can be prepared beforehand. How often have we read a brother's obituary and thought, "Oh, clearly, that Masonic part was written by the profane." How much easier might those arrangements have been if a brother had left some instructions ahead of time?

In our everyday life, many of us are prepared. Perhaps we carry a pocket knife, multi-tool, and a small flashlight. With those tools, many unexpected contingencies can be dealt with. Why not be prepared for those large, significant life events – as that couple in California was? Why not make it a bit easier for your loved ones after you have laid down your working tools?

Be prepared... it's the right thing to do. Make a list. Ensure your loved ones know where your apron is and what they should do with it. If you want the Masonic part of your obituary to read a certain way, write it down.

We never like to think much about those times, but they will come for every one of us. The least we can do is to make it easier on those we leave behind.

236th ANNUAL COMMUNICATION

OF THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE A.F. & A.M. OF THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT

The 236th Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge A.F. & A. M. of Connecticut will be held at the **Marriott Hartford/Windsor Airport, 28 Day Hill Road, Windsor, CT 06095** (I91, exit 38), on Saturday, **April 5, 2025.** The formal opening of the Grand Lodge will be at 9:30 A.M.

This is the "CALL" to that meeting.

Registration will start at 8:00 A.M. Please note: **All voting delegates must register at the registration table and present their 2025 Dues Card to the Grand Tiler upon entry to the session**. Registration will be by Home/Primary Lodge number as designated by posted signs in the area.

A proxy form will be sent directly to the Lodge Worshipful Master, Senior Warden and Junior Warden should they: 1) not be able to attend this Annual Communication in person [proxy must be executed in advance]; 2) be entitled to vote by virtue of holding one of these offices in more than one lodge; 3) be entitled to vote by virtue of being a Grand Lodge Officer or a permanent member of Grand Lodge. Please inform any brother who is attending as a proxy that he must present his 2025 dues card. All brothers entitled to vote should bring the apron and jewel of their office, whether as permanent member, lodge officer or serving as proxy.

Your attendance at this Annual Communication is important. We will consider available reports of Standing and Special Committees, Grand Lodge Officer reports, and any other business proper to be considered, all subject to the usual rules. There may be certain changes to the Rules & Regulations which will be considered for adoption.

Please note the following Sections of our Grand Lodge Rules and Regulations regarding lodge representation:

Section 2301. Penalty if Lodge Is Not Represented at Regular Grand Lodge Communication: (reads in part) "A Lodge neglecting to be represented at a Regular Grand Lodge Communication shall incur the penalty of two hundred and fifty (\$250) dollars ..."

The Grand Lodge Office cannot make hotel reservations. Lodges and brothers are responsible for making their own reservations with the **Marriott Hartford/Windsor Airport.** We encourage you to make your hotel reservations as soon as possible. Room rate is \$140 per night plus tax. Last day to book is **Friday, March 14, 2025**. <u>VOTING:</u> Grand Lodge Officers, Past Grand Masters, District Deputies, Past District Deputies, current Associate Grand Marshals, and current Grand Lodge Standing Committee members must register in order to vote.

Each voting delegate will register **only once**, **either by virtue of his highest attained Grand Lodge Masonic office or Committee Membership or, if he chooses, as an elector (proxy) on behalf of his lodge.** The use of proxies is encouraged where appropriate to ensure full representation of constituent lodges.

FRIDAY BANQUET: The Grand Master's Banquet for Grand Lodge Officers, Distinguished Guests, members of the Craft and their ladies will be held on Friday evening, April 4, 2025, at 7:00 pm with a social hour at 6:00 pm in the Windsor Ballroom. All brothers and their ladies are invited to attend. Reservations for this and all other meals will be made through the Grenadine Event Management website/app link qrto.org/44uGkN (best with Google Chrome or Microsoft Edge). The deadline for reservation tickets is March 20, 2025.

The entrée will be at a cost of \$60 with a choice of <u>Flat Iron Steak</u>, <u>Chicken Marsala</u>, <u>Filet of Salmon</u>, <u>Vegetarian</u>, and <u>Vegan</u> **all by advance order**. <u>All prices are per person and include tax and gratuity</u>. Banquet tickets will be mailed to those placing an order <u>prior to March 20, 2025</u>. For orders received after that date, tickets will be held at the door.



Grand Master's Message

Love

ebruary has historically been devoted to the emotion of love and

affection and is denoted by the color red, suggesting passion. As we wind down this Masonic season of installations, I am overwhelmed by the unity of family, not just Masonically but marital and biological. Spouses attended installations in support; family children attended and, more importantly, participated. In many installations I was fortunate enough to attend, a spouse, family member, or child would participate in the ceremony, presenting the collar and jewel, top hat, or the Worshipful Master's unique personalized gavel. This inclusion and participation is so important to the success of the lodge as several times a family member, more especially a spouse, would genuinely ask, "What can I do? I want to do more; I want to help."

As Masons and men in general, we need to take this time, above what we do all year long, to show our significant others how much we truly care for them. Reflect upon your interactions all year long and align something special they will remember, as I am sure they are doing the same for us. To my brothers and sisters, at this time of year, I summon the lyrics I used at the Saturday Grand Lodge Banquet almost one year ago, in the immortal words of the poet James Taylor, "Shower the People You Love with Love."

Music, among other mediums, helps to solidify events, people, and surroundings, as do aromas, visual cues, and all our other senses. But music, for me, is the greatest memory recall mechanism. All

throughout my life, it seems I have been tied to a motor vehicle, and its radio has been a gentle companion.

In the 70s, there was a song by 10CC, "I'm Not In Love," a haunting ballad of an artist trying to convince himself that he wasn't in love, but in fact, he was, and that alarmed him, as he experienced the sense of being powerless to another person, yielding his emotions for the good of another...of sacrifice. In the 80s, the song by Air Supply, "Lost in Love," had special significance for me. As an adolescent struggling with emotions and starting my adult life, I truly felt lost in love.

All my life, there has been love and love of music, even to this day. It is an experience we all encounter. I will humbly close with my favorite artist, Sting. He has many compositions of the human condition, especially love, but in this mindset, I find myself reflecting upon the piece entitled "If You Love Somebody Set Them Free." For me, this not only applies to people but also to other meaningful things in our lives. To that, I will add Freemasonry. Soon, I will be out of office and must step aside because it is right, as well as my sworn duty. I honestly and genuinely love Freemasonry, yet I must set it free for my successor. And with that, I reflect on something I have said more than once: "I love you more." CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR BOARD SERVICE

February 2025

To Prospective Masonicare Board and Committee Members:

By this notice, the Board of Trustees of Masonicare Corporation hereby issues a Call for Nominations of candidates for election to the Board of Trustees of Masonicare Corporation, the Board of Directors of The Masonic Charity Foundation of Connecticut and/or Masonicare Board Committees. To be considered for service, nominees need not specify in which board/committee they are interested in serving. Individuals may request a Nomination Application by completing and returning the questionnaire below.

Applications are to be submitted to me and postmarked no later than <u>April 16, 2025</u>. Applicants will be contacted to schedule interviews.

Nominees should have qualifications in business, corporate leadership, finance, law or healthcare, which qualify them for board service. Candidates should be aware that board/committee members assume fiduciary duties with respect to their service, and that violation of these duties can entail personal liability. Service on our boards/committees requires a considerable time commitment, varying with the needs of each corporation. While Masonicare's boards/committees are primarily comprised of those who are specifically members of the Masonic fraternity or related appendant bodies, affiliate board and Masonicare committee membership may also contain qualified members of the local community.

MASONICARE is the Parent Corporation of our system, and all nominees must be members in good standing of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M. of Connecticut, with the exception of three who shall be members in good standing, and appointed one each from The Grand Chapter of Connecticut, Order of the Eastern Star; the Order of the Amaranth, State of Connecticut; and Prince Hall Grand Lodge, F. & A.M. of Connecticut. The Board of Trustees is composed of no less than fourteen but no more than seventeen members. Three seats are filled annually by members in good standing of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M. of Connecticut, through the nomination and election process. Two seats are filled by the Board of Trustees as strategic members of the Board. The term of service on this board is three years, commencing in November 2025.

The term of service for The Masonic Charity Foundation of Connecticut Board of Directors and for Masonicare Board Committees is one year commencing in November 2025.

Celebrating a Historic Milestone for Connecticut DeMolay





Fayette Lodge No. 69: 200 Years of Faithful Service to Masonry by Perne R. Maynard

The year was 1825, and George Washington, America's first commander in chief, had passed away only 25 years earlier. The Masonic fraternity was growing rapidly, and a new charter was issued on May 30, 1825, to 28 new members. WB Horatio Arnold Hamilton was elected the first Worshipful Master, with the other members of this new lodge coming from Morning Star Lodge, No. 28 in Warehouse Point, and Wolcott Lodge, No. 60 in Stafford Hollow. From those simple beginnings, Fayette Lodge No. 69 was born.

On August 15, 1824, General Lafayette came to America and began his welcome tour of New England. On September 3, he traveled from Boston through Tolland and Coventry to Hartford, and the crowds were not disappointed when they saw him. He was no longer 19 as he was when he came to fight in the Revolutionary War as an officer under General Washington; he was now 67 but looked younger. On May 18, 1825, the brothers named their new lodge Fayette in honor of General Lafayette. Fayette Lodge No. 69 held its first meeting on October 1, 1825, at the William Morgan Tavern, the home of Ortive Eaton, in Ellington,



building. Today, the building is opposite the Ellington Center School.

In the following 200 years, Fayette Lodge relocated to 10 different buildings throughout Ellington, and in 1955, Fayette purchased the building from the Apostolic Christian Church at 141 Orchard St.

After a local fire two years ago, and with thanks to the many brothers and lodges who contributed generously, the lodge was renovated into an updated, beautiful Masonic facility.

His seven decades toiling in the quarry have included time as a Knight Templar, Past Thrice Illustrious Master in Council, with memberships in the Scottish Rite, York Rite, and Order of the Amaranth, where he was a Past Grand Royal Patron.

The evening was delightful as RWB Lloyd offered the circumambulation prayer with footnotes and observations. Soon after, he dove into the primary purpose of his visit as he recited with fervor two poems, The Cremation of Sam McGee and The Lion and Albert, to act as an example of how memory work can instill a sense of joy and fulfillment. It entertains and it educates much like the ritual lectures Masons learn for degrees. Thus, the new brothers were encouraged to apply themselves to their Steward's lecture memorization as it would serve them well in the coming years.

Additionally, it was a Step-up Night for the lodge's incoming officers, who shook off the first-night jitters of their own memories and got the job done. With a few surprise guests in attendance, the evening was complete.

St. John's Lodge No. 2 Last Installation in Their 100-Year-Old Home by Jeffrey A Blayman

Since being chartered in 1754, St John's Lodge No. 2 enjoyed a glorious legacy in many buildings leading up to the laying of the cornerstone at 33 Pleasant Street in Middletown on October 31, 1925. The Grand Master, MWB Walter T. Arnold, opened the Grand Lodge in ample form at 4:30 p.m., and the cornerstone was laid with the ancient ceremonies. On the evening of January 6, nearly 100 years later, brethren and friends assembled to install the last Worshipful Master who will preside in this iconic lodge.

Over the years, attendance at the lodge dwindled, building maintenance became exhausting, no fundraisers could be held, the lodge coffers were running dry, and with the tragic

loss of RWB Francis DiStefano, the infrastructure began to crumble. WB Robert Grismer took up the gavel and continued to lead for four years in an effort to keep the lodge operational.

The enormous lodge room now seems empty, but it wasn't always, as evidenced by the names on the backs of all the chairs... seeing the 150-plus seats full of brothers would have been magnificent. The famous pipe organ, one of only two in the jurisdiction, recently sold off to a good home in the Midwest. The anteroom and its cupboard are full of aprons and artifacts that date back centuries. The chamber of reflection sits dark and forgotten, the costumes for Scottish Rite and York Rite degrees sit dusty in an upstairs closet, Templar swords too numerous to count hang idly across the wall. What once was a grand beacon of Masonry in the district is

slowly losing its light.

And so, on this frigid winter night, the lodge and friends gathered to install WB Gerardo Nero, the last Master of St. John's Lodge who will preside at Pleasant Street. Nine other brothers awaited installation alongside the Master, each with a solemn sense of duty. MWB George Greytak officiated the

St. John's Lodge No. 2 brothers will now meet in Meriden, but the 271st Installation of Officers was a proper send-off for such a unique and monumental structure.

Brothers of St. Andrew's Lodge No. 64 Give Back to the Community



Bro. Dr. Richard Silverman Receives David Wooster Medal in Silver by Steve Lewis

On December 18, 2024, MWB Edward C. Page presented Bro. and Dr. Richard Silverman of King Solomon's Lodge No. 7 with the rarely bestowed and highly distinguished David Wooster Medal in Silver. RWB Albin Weber lead the proceedings and read a personal testimonial emphasizing Dr. Silverman's dedication to his profession and his craft.

The Medal memorializes the Revolutionary War hero Brigadier General David Wooster, who commanded a Connecticut militia and is credited with organizing Hiram Lodge No. 1 in New Haven in 1750, the first chartered Connecticut lodge. This earned him the moniker "Father of Freemasonry in Connecticut."

The David Wooster Medal was struck in 1973 to recognize "service other than to Freemasonry in the fields of art, science, business, government, entertainment, religion, or other service to humanity." Two castings were approved, one in silver for Master Masons and one in bronze for non-Masons. While no more than two silver and two bronze medals may be given in any year, no more than two or three have been awarded in the past 10 years.

RWB Weber petitioned Grand Lodge to consider Bro. Silverman after his life-saving encounter in Waterbury Hospital during the COVID-19 epidemic. RWB Weber was presented to Bro. Silverman with an advanced and critical case of COVID-19. As Chief Pulmonologist at Waterbury Hospital, Dr. Silverman immediately placed RWB Weber in intensive care, where he remained intubated and in critical condition for 61 days.

Upon learning that RWB Weber was a Mason, Dr. Silverman opened the front of his isolation suit and showed Albin his Masonic emblazoned tee shirt. He then proclaimed to Albin in no uncertain terms, "I will be standing here in front of you when you are fully recovered."

When RWB Weber was released from Waterbury Hospital, Bro. Silverman arranged placement in one of the best rehabilitation facilities in Connecticut. Under his direction, he organized Albin's home care and, in his usual "above and beyond the call" manifestation, assisted RWB Weber and his wife by managing the complex rules of the insurance labyrinth. This is Dr. Silverman's typically considerate behavior. He is action-oriented, outcomedriven, and treats every patient with an equanimity of care.

In addition to RWB Weber, Dr. Silverman treated hundreds of patients during that dreadful time, of which another dozen were Masons. His dedication to all was equally motivated, yet he took extra time and effort to soothe the woes, concerns, and discomfitures of his Masonic brethren and their families.

His medical peers describe Dr. Silverman as: "A person who goes above and beyond the call of duty." Bro. Silverman's dedication and passion are engrained in his persona. In 2010, his colleagues designated him "Humanitarian of the Year."

Bro. Silverman's contribution to remedying human suffering isn't limited to his daily duties at Waterbury Hospital. An article by Amy Mulvihill in CT Insider describes how Bro. Silverman developed an incentives program to alleviate depression in elderly nursing home residents.

"Quickly diagnosing that what many of these patients needed was not more medicine but good old-fashioned human interaction, Dr. Silverman began offering his patients an incentives program. And it worked."

In addition to developing and implementing the highly effective techniques, Dr. Silverman personally funded the operation. The success of Dr. Silverman's effort led him to form a non-



On December 29, 2024, the 39th President of the United States, James "Jimmy" Carter, passed away at the age of 100. Jimmy Carter's one-term presidency is remembered for the events that overwhelmed it—inflation, the energy crisis, the war in Afghanistan, and hostages in Iran. In the past two decades, however, there has been wider recognition that Carter, despite a lack of experience, confronted several huge problems with steadiness, courage, and idealism. This author's grandfather, serving as the Secretary-Treasurer for Seafarers International Union, headquartered a short distance from Washington, developed a relationship with Mr. Carter and supported him throughout his political years and eventually in the White House. Mr. Carter attended my grandfather's funeral in 1990.

Lately, there has been speculation regarding President Carter and Freemasonry. There were rumors about his ties to the fraternity. In fact, President Carter was not a Freemason. However, in 2016, Shriners Hospitals named Jimmy Carter as an honorary Shriner and an Ambassador for their program, and there is a picture of him wearing the signature red fez though with the golden tassel.

There is perhaps another link between President Carter and Freemasonry. In 1980, Union Lodge No. 40 received a letter from President Carter's press secretary congratulating the lodge on its 200 years of service.

2025 looks to be a bright year for Union Lodge. There is an energetic line of officers focused on improving the lodge's operations, a rededication to service and a year of celebration in which the lodge hopes brothers across the state will join in.


Corinthian Lodge No. 104 Enjoys a Great Year of Community Support by Pedro Garcia

We will return to our recent theme of "learning to subdue our passions." Energy is not something you obtain externally but something of which you are comprised. It is often referred to as spirit, especially in ecclesiastical contexts. It flows through every facet of your physical body, just as blood travels through your body's circulatory system and oxygen travels through your lungs and eventually into your bloodstream. "Without the control of energy, Man is but a leaf in the wind of the forces of the Universe," per the Hermetician Franz Bardon.




